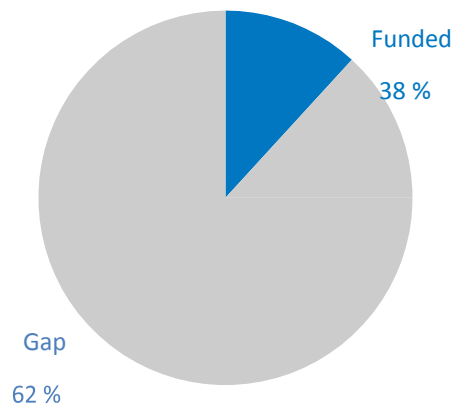

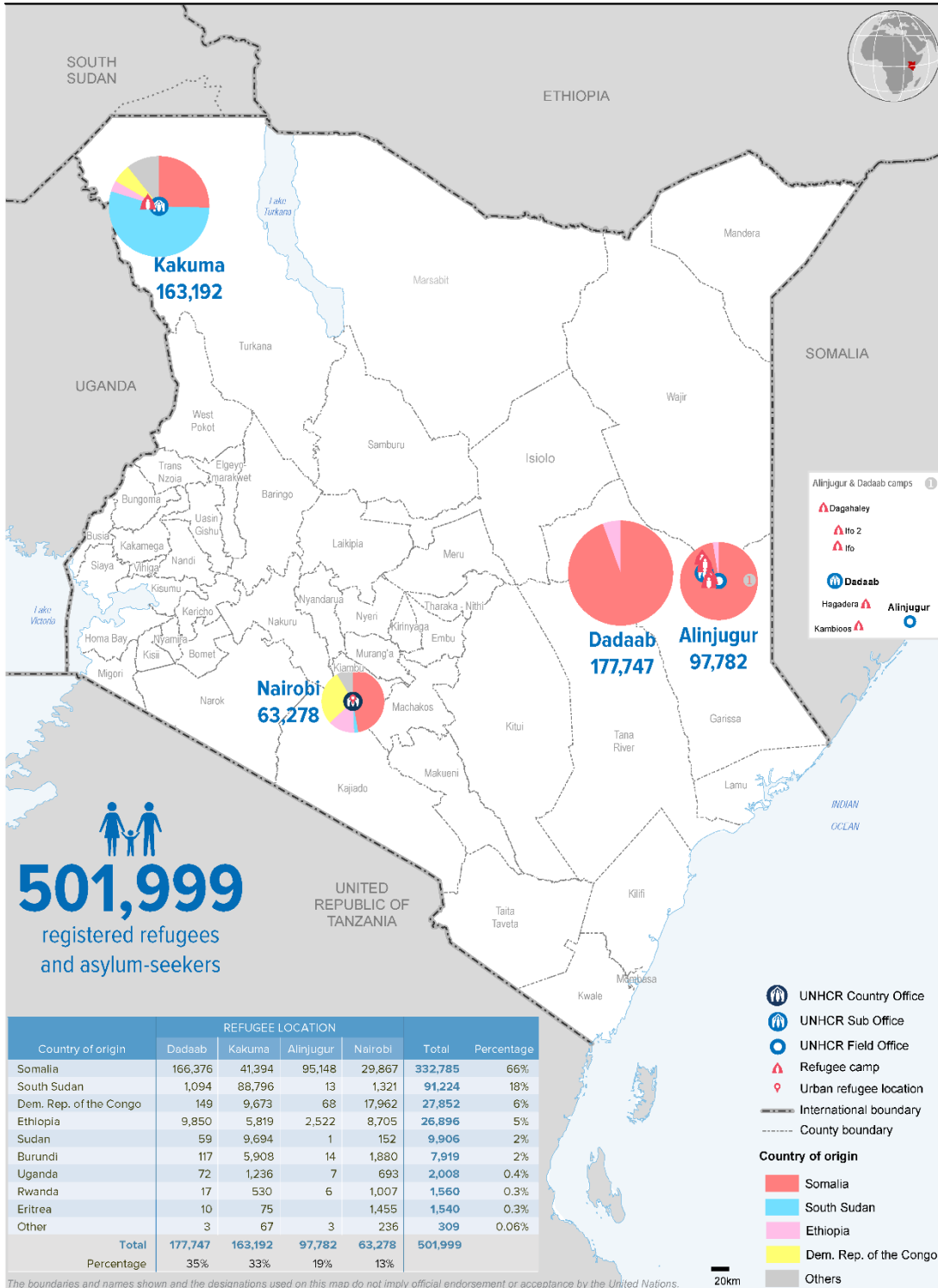

HIGHLIGHTS

- UNHCR Special Envoy on the Somali Refugee Situation, Ambassador Mohamed Affey visited Dadaab Operation on 8 th November. The main objective of UNHCR special envoys to was to advocate with the Government of Kenya to continue providing asylum and protection to Somali refugees, emphasis on establishment of regional platform for finding solutions for Somali situation in the region, strengthening durable solutions for Somali refugees and discussion with the refugees in Dadaab camps in order to understand their key challenges.
- The Minister for interior of Jubaland administration accompanied by the National Commission for Refugees and IDPs affairs visited Dadaab. The objective of their visit was to have direct discussions with refugees on the voluntary repatriation process and in particular communication to refugees on the lifting of suspension on the facilitation of road convoys.
- A total of 21,684 new arrivals have been registered since the beginning of 2016 including 5,109 new arrivals registered in November of which 4,685 individuals are from South Sudan.
- As of 30 November 2016, Kalobeyei settlement had a population of 12,784 refugees (6,598 female and 6,186 male).
- KCPE results have been released with 2 refugee students from Kakuma scoring above 400 out of the possible 500 marks, making them among the top performers in Turkana county and nationally.
- A total of 221 individuals from 64 families were airlifted from Dadaab and settled in Kalobeyei in the month of November 2016.
- The Refugees Bill 2016 came up for a second reading in parliament on 23rd and 28th November 2016. UNHCR continues to support the process.
- UNHCR continued its interventions to support the refugees' host community areas affected by the drought during the last six months in Dadaab, Fafi and Wajir South Sub-counties.

MAIN ACTIVITIES

Protection

Registration and Refugees Status Determination (RSD)

- A total of 3,988 new-borns have been registered in Kakuma since the beginning of 2016 with 548 new-borns registered in November.
- A total of 321 applications were processed in Nairobi for new-born addition which forms part of continuous registration activities. 155 were born in 2016 and 166 born in the previous years.
- One New arrival was registered in the UNHCR database after being referred by the Refugee Affairs Secretariat. The individual, who is a Somali national, was registered under exceptional life circumstances, in order to allow for access to critical medication attention. 968 new arrivals have been identified through a listing and profiling exercise that has been going on in all the Dadaab camps.

Protection Monitoring

- The operation continues to conduct regular missions to Nadapal border for the purpose of protection monitoring and pick-up of new arrivals.
- There was one reported case of forcible refoulement on 2 November 2016 involving a south Sudanese person of concern (PoC).

Child Protection

- Children and youth represent 76% of the refugee population in Kakuma. UNHCR and its Child protection partners provide individual social support and psycho-social support to a considerably high number of children at risk including 515 number of unaccompanied minors (UAMs) and 167 number of separated children.
- Due to an influx of South Sudanese refugees, the Child protection working group established a detailed contingency plan for child protection (as a result, additional staff have been deployed at the border and at the reception center to support both identification of children at risk and provision of psycho-social support).

SGBV

- On the 25 November 2016, UNHCR, the Government of Kenya and implementing partners launched the 16 Days of Activisms against Gender Based Violence themed "Healthy Relationships at Home, in Schools and in the Community." Activities were held in Narobi, Kakuma and Dadaab to commemorate this annual event.

Statelessness

- UNHCR held a public participation event to raise awareness and support for statelessness communities in the country during the second anniversary of the #IBelong Campaign to end statelessness.



Community Empowerment and Self-Reliance

- UNHCR in collaboration with LWF conducted three trainings on Community Based Protection to support the implementation of the community outreach project. The trainings targeted 20 community mobilization and outreach volunteers, 45 refugee community leaders and 42 key members of the new arrivals in Kalobeyei Settlement.
- 21 POCs were supported to start micro-enterprises during the month. 17 of them were supported through micro-franchise arrangement to market Nescafe and Coca-cola products, and Ecozoom solar kits and jikos; 4 were provided start up grants for various small business initiatives.
- Two refugee businesses (14 POCs) were also supported to obtain business licenses to enable them operate legally in Nairobi.
- 125 members of the LGBTI community were provided support to initiate small businesses or undertake skills training.
- 24 groups from Hagadera and Ifo received small business grants of Ksh140, 000 per group. The grants which were disbursed through Equity Bank will facilitate expansion of their businesses.
- The Artsists for Refugees Annual Gala was held in Nairobi. Artists from Kakuma, Dadaab and Nairobi showcased their skills and talent in music and visual art. All artwork by the refugees and a music CD dubbed 'Refugeenius' were on sale. All proceeds will go to the respective artists since this is a livelihoods project.



Education

- The Kenya Certificate for Primary Education (KCPE) final exams was administered to 3,982 candidates in Kakuma from the 1-3 November 2016. Of the 3,982 candidates there were 861 (21.6%) female and 3,121 (78.4%) male candidates.
- The Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education (KCSE) examinations was administered to 802 candidates in Kakuma from the 7-30 November 2016. 160 (19.95%) of the candidates were female and 642 (80.05%) were male candidates. No incidents of exam regularities were reported during the administration of KCPE and KCSE national exams.
- The total enrolment in camp schools in Kakuma as at November 2016 was 81,205 (39.3% girls) learners.
- 20 candidates (13F 7M) sat for the Kenya Certificate of Primary Education (KCPE) national examinations various schools across Nairobi.
- A total of 3,429 refugee students had registered to take the KCPE in Dadaab. 1,409 refugee students in secondary schools in Dadaab sat for their KCSE.
- UNHCR in collaboration with Vodafone Foundation facilitated a three-day induction training for Instant Network Schools (INS) coaches, ICT instructors and teachers supporting the program for 40 participants in Dadaab.
- UNHCR in collaboration with UNICEF and Windle Trust Kenya (WTK) conducted training for 300 teachers from 7 secondary schools in Dadaab on Conflict sensitive education.



Health

- The annual health and nutrition survey was conducted within the month of November in Kakuma and Kalobeyei. The preliminary results indicate that the GAM rates for Kakuma are 13.5% (serious) with SAM 1.3% and Kalobeyei GAM 8.9% (poor) SAM 1.5%.
- A total of 5,279 under 5 children received consultation within the facilities with the leading causes of morbidity being respiratory tract infection, watery diarrhea and malaria.
- The health situation in Kakuma remains stable with crude mortality of 0.1/1000/month and under five mortality of 0.5/1000/month which are within UNHCR standard of 0.8/1000/month and 1.5/1000/month respectively.
- Health and nutritional screening for children under five years and pregnant and lactating women are on-going at Nadapal Transit center.



Food Security and Nutrition

- On 10th November, WFP announced a ration cut for the general food distribution, which will be down to 50% effective December 2016. Given that malnutrition already increased in 2016 following 2015 ration cuts, this is expected to have a negative impact on refugees and make them more vulnerable to malnutrition.



Water and Sanitation

- A total of 37 5000 Litre plastic tanks were installed at Kalobeyei Settlement.
- A total of 13,819 m of water distribution pipeline has been laid in Kalobeyei.
- Latrine user ratio in Kakuma was 1:6 for both shared and household latrines. The overall coverage stood at 77.9% for both shared and household latrines.
- A total of 3,892 new latrines have been constructed in Kakuma Refugee Camp while in Kalobeyei settlement, 914 family-shared latrines have so far been constructed.



Shelter & NFIs

- UNHCR in collaboration with Peace Winds Japan (PWJ) has completed the construction of 533 shelters in Hagadera camp. Construction of another 467 is in progress. Following the recent rains in Dadaab camps, 1,000 families residing in Hagadera were found to be in need of support. The Assessment was conducted by UNHCR jointly with Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) in Hagadera Camp.



Durable Solutions

Voluntary Return

- 104 individuals from Kakuma were assisted to return to Somalia through volrep in the month of November 2016.
- 2 families comprising of 8 individuals voluntarily returned to Mogadishu from Nairobi in November bringing the total number of returnees from urban areas to 24.
- During the period under review 1,150 returnees were supported to voluntarily return to Somalia and in particular to Mogadishu, Kismayu and Baidoa from Dadaab. Overall, a total of 36,243 returnees were supported since the beginning of the process on the 8th December 2014, out of which 30,142 returned this year 2016 from Dadaab refugee operations.

Resettlement

- A list of 2,153 individuals of the 3,500 targeted has been submitted to resettlement countries for resettlement consideration.
- A total of 109 cases totalling 288 individuals were referred from Nairobi and submitted to the U.S.A., Australia, Sweden and Canada for resettlement consideration.
