## Update on budgets and funding (2023 and 2024)

## Summary

In October 2022, at its seventy-third plenary session, the Executive Committee approved an original annual budget of $\$ 10,211.3$ million for 2023.

In 2023, five supplementary budgets amounting to a combined total of $\$ 817.5$ million were established in support of the earthquake emergency response situation in Syria and Türkiye; and support for the situations in Pakistan, Somalia, Sudan and Ukraine. Furthermore, a budget reduction of $\$ 100.0$ million was implemented in Iraq. They bring the total final budget for 2023 to $\$ 10,928.7 .0$ million as of 31 December 2023.

The original budget for 2024 as approved by the Executive Committee at its seventy-fourth plenary session in October 2023 amounted to $\$ 10,621.7$ million. Since then, a supplementary budget in the amount of $\$ 143.7$ million has been established in support of the Sudan situation, bringing the total current budget for 2024 to $\$ 10,765.4$ million as of 31 January 2024, the cut-off date for this report.

Pending the annual closure of the accounts for 2023, the provisional total funds available for 2023 amount to $\$ 5,501.2$ million, while provisional expenditure stands at $\$ 4,986.9$ million. When comparing the final annual budget for 2023 to the provisional total funds available, the result is a funding gap of $\$ 5,427.5$ million, or 49.7 per cent.
A draft decision on budgets and funding for 2023 and 2024 is provided in annex IX. Upon request of Member States, the last paragraph of the draft decision has been amended, with the new language in bold.

## I. Introduction

1. This document provides a preliminary update on the 2023 budget. ${ }^{1}$ As the closure of accounts had not yet been completed at the time of writing, all year-end figures for 2023 are provisional. This document also provides an overview of the estimated budget requirements for 2024 as of 31 January 2024.

- The original and final annual budget and provisional expenditure for 2023 are summarized in annex I.
- Annex II(a) and II(b) show transfers from the operational reserve for 2023 and 2024.
- Annexes III(a) and III(b) provide an overview of the supplementary budgets by situation, region and impact areas for 2023 and 2024.
- Annex IV shows overall contributions recorded for 2023.
- Annex V gives a breakdown by country of 2023 contributions from non-governmental organizations, foundations, and private donors.
- Annex VI provides the list of unearmarked and softly earmarked voluntary contributions in 2023.
- Annex VII shows the original and current annual budgets for 2024 as of 31 January 2024.
- Annex VIII shows the latest provisional (mid-2023) statistics on persons of concern to UNHCR by country/territory of asylum.
- Annex IX provides the draft decision on budgets and funding for 2023 and 2024.

2. The final annual budget, funding, and expenditure figures for 2023, which will be available following the closure of accounts on 31 March 2024, will be reported at the ninetieth meeting of the Standing Committee in June 2024.

## II. Budgets and funding for 2023

## Total budget

3. In October 2022, at its seventy-third session, the Executive Committee approved an original annual budget of $\$ 10,211.3$ million for $2023 .{ }^{2}$ The final 2023 budget of $\$ 10,928.7$ million represents the sum of the approved original budget of $\$ 10,211.3$ million, supplementary budgets totalling $\$ 817.5$ million, established by the High Commissioner in the course of 2023, in accordance with rule $208.2^{3}$ of the financial rules for voluntary funds administered by the High Commissioner for Refugees, and a budget reduction of $\$ 100$. 0 million for the Iraq operation as reported at the eighty-eighth meeting of the Standing Committee in September 2023. Details of the final 2023 budget are provided in annex I.

## Supplementary budgets

4. At the eighty-eighth meeting of the Standing Committee in September 2023, five supplementary budgets totalling $\$ 711.6$ million were approved, comprising $\$ 250.0$ million in support for the Ukraine situation; $\$ 201.3$ million for the earthquake emergency response situation (Türkiye and northern Syrian Arab Republic); $\$ 162.8$ million for the Sudan situation; $\$ 55.8$ million for the Pakistan situation and $\$ 41.7$ million for the Somalia situation. Subsequently, an additional supplementary budget of $\$ 105.8$ million was issued for the Sudan situation. This brings the total of supplementary budgets to $\$ 817.5$

[^0]million as of 31 December 2023. An overview of supplementary budgets by situation is provided in table II. 1 below. A more detailed breakdown by situation, region and impact areas is shown in annex III(a).

## Preliminary programme assessment

5. In 2023, humanitarian crises grew in scale and complexity with UNHCR responding to 43 emergencies in 29 countries. Some 7.4 million relief items were dispatched to up to 16.7 million people. The global number of forcibly displaced people, resulting from persecution, armed conflict, human rights violations and violence, often compounded by climate emergencies, continued to rise and reached a staggering 114 million. UNHCR responded with life-saving assistance and protection to the people affected by earthquakes in Afghanistan, the Syrian Arab Republic and Türkiye, conflict in Sudan, a deteriorating crisis in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, unprecedented mixed movements of refugees and migrants in Latin America and the Caribbean, as well as floods in Libya and the Horn of Africa. To meet growing challenges, the Office bolstered efforts to collaborate and engage with a wide array of actors.

## Preliminary year-end financial analysis

6. The impact area distribution of the final budget for 2023 of $\$ 10,928.7$ million is shown in table II. 2 below.

7. The final budget of $\$ 10,928.7$ million for 2023 comprises programmed activities of
$\$ 10,462.9$ million; an operational reserve of $\$ 453.8$ million and $\$ 12.0$ million for Junior Professional Officers as also shown in annex 1.
8. The preliminary financial analysis for 2023 based on provisional figures, pending the financial closure of accounts, is described below and summarized in table II.3.
9.. The provisional amount of funds available for the period ending 31 December 2023 stood at $\$ 5,501.2$ million. This amount comprised:

- $\quad \$ 573.2$ million carried over from the budget year 2022;
- $\$ 4,834.8$ million in voluntary contributions recorded in 2023, plus $\$ 196.4$ million recorded in prior years for activities with implementation in 2023, minus $\$ 247.8$ million recorded in 2023 for activities with implementation in future years;
- $\$ 44.6$ million allotted to UNHCR from the United Nations regular budget; and
- $\$ 100.0$ million currently estimated in other funds available and adjustments, mainly prior-year cancellations and adjustments, and miscellaneous income.

10. When compared to the $\$ 6,180.3$ million funds available in 2022, the provisional amount of funds available in 2023 decreased by $\$ 679.1$ million, or 11.0 per cent.
11. Comparing the total funds available of $\$ 5,501.2$ million for 2023 with the total final needs of $\$ 10,928.7$ million for the same year, the funding gap amounted to $\$ 5,427.5$ million, or 49.7 per cent of the total final needs.
12. Provisional expenditure amounted to $\$ 4,986.9$ million. This was $\$ 620.2$ million or 11.1 per cent less than the $\$ 5,607$. 1 million expenditures in 2022.
13. The carry-over into 2024 is projected to be $\$ 514.3$ million, consisting mainly of funds earmarked to specific operations.

## III. Overview of 2024

## Total requirements

14. The original annual budget for 2024 approved by the Executive Committee at its seventy-fourth plenary session in October 2023, was $\$ 10,621.7$ million. ${ }^{4}$

## Supplementary budgets

15. As of 31 January, the cut-off date for this report, the High Commissioner has established one supplementary budget for 2024 amounting to $\$ 143.7$ million in support for the Sudan situation. This brings the total current budget for 2023 to $\$ 10,765.4$ million. Further details on the 2024 supplementary budget are shown in annex III(b).

## Impact areas

16. The 2024 original and current budget are presented in Table III. 1 below by impact area. It shows the net effect of the supplementary budget, internal transfers and adjustments made by the High Commissioner in accordance with financial rule 208.2. ${ }^{5}$ Detailed figures for the original and current budget for 2024 are provided in annex VII.

17. The response of Member States at the Ad hoc Committee of the General Assembly for the Announcement of Voluntary Contributions to the High Commissioner's Programme (Pledging Conference), held in December 2023, confirmed a sustained commitment to supporting the vital programmes of UNHCR. Initial pledges for 2024 reached $\$ 973.0$ million. Although this amount does not cover the entirety of the assessed needs of persons of concern to UNHCR, it enables the Office to plan and continue operations that provide lifesaving assistance and protection without interruption. Donors are encouraged to continue to respond generously to the High Commissioner's appeal for resources to meet the requirements for 2024, including through unearmarked funds.

${ }^{2}$ Refugees include individuals recognized under the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees, its 1967 Protocol, the 1969 Organization of African Unity (OAU) Convention Governing the Specific Aspects of Refugee Problems in Africa, the refugee definition contained in the 1984 Cartagena Declaration on Refugees as incorporated into national laws, those recognized in accordance with the UNHCR Statute, individuals granted complementary forms of protection, and those enjoying temporary protection. In the absence of Government figures, UNHCR has estimated the refugee population in many industrialized countries based on 10 years of individual asylum-seeker recognition.

This category is descriptive in nature and includes groups of people who are outside their country or territory of origin and who face protection risks similar to those of refugees, but for whom refugee status has, for practical or other reasons, not been ascertained.
${ }^{4}$ Asylum-seekers (with pending cases) are individuals who have sought international protection and whose claims for refugee status have not yet been determined. Those covered in this table refer to claimants whose individual applications were pending at the end of 2022, irrespective of when those claims may have been lodged.

For the purposes of UNHCR's statistics, this population includes only conflict-generated internally displaced persons to whom the Office extends protection and/or assistance.
${ }^{8}$ Internally displaced persons of concern to UNHCR who have returned to their place of origin during the reporting year.
${ }^{9}$ Refers to persons who are not considered as nationals by any State under the operation of its law. This category refers to persons who fall under the agency's statelessness mandate because they are stateless according to this international definition, but data from some countries may also include persons with undetermined nationality. The figure reported includes stateless persons who are also refugees or asylum-seekers from Myanmar, internally displaced persons in Myanmar, or others of concern to UNHCR. However, due to the extraordinary size of the displaced stateless population from Myanmar, UNHCR considers it important to reflect the dual status that this population group possesses. According to information shared by the Dominican delegation during the 2019 High-Level Segment on Statelessness, approximately 48 per cent of the total Group A population of 61,049 persons had been authorized by the National Electoral Board (JCE) to request their nationality documentation. Additionally, as of December 2019, over 1,700 Group B persons ( 900 of which were children) had submitted applications for naturalization to the Ministry of Interior and of the Police (MIP). However, no naturalization decisions concerning this population had been issued by December 2022.

In the specific context of Latvia, the "Non-citizens" enjoy the right to reside in Latvia ex lege and a set of rights and obligations generally beyond the rights prescribed by the 1954 Convention relating to the Status of Stateless Persons, including protection from removal, and as such the "Non-citizens" may currently be considered persons to whom the Convention does not apply in accordance with Article 1.2(ii).

The number of stateless persons remaining in Rakhine State following violence in 2016 and 2017 and large scale departures to Bangladesh is based on detailed estimates for each village tract made by UNHCR, other United Nations agencies and non-governmental organizations in early 2018, which concluded that between 532,000 to 600,000 Rohingya remained in Rakhine State, increasing to 630,000 due to additional displacement since 2022 (including an estimated 153,600 of those Rohingya who have been internally displaced).

## Annex IX

## Draft decision on budgets and funding for 2023 and 2024

## The Standing Committee,

Recalling the Executive Committee's decisions, at its seventy-fourth session on administrative, financial and programme matters (A/78/12/add.1, para 12 (c)) as well as its discussions under the programme budgets and funding item at the eighty-eight meeting of the Standing Committee in September 2023,

Reaffirming the importance of greater responsibility-sharing in solidarity with countries hosting refugees,

Recalls that the Executive Committee, at its seventy-third session, approved original programmes and budgets for country and regional programmes, global programmes and headquarters under the UNHCR 2023 annual programme budget, amounting to \$10,211.3 million,

Notes that the final 2023 supplementary budgets amounted to $\$ 817.5$ million for programmes benefiting the UNHCR programmes and projects,

Takes note of the increase in the UNHCR annual budget for 2023 to a final total of $\$ 10,928.7$ million, representing the sum of the original budget of $\$ 10,211.3$ million, the final supplementary budgets of $\$ 817.5$ million and a budget reduction of $\$ 100.0$ million,

Recalls that the Executive Committee, at its seventy-fourth session in October 2023, approved original programmes and budgets for country and regional programmes, global programmes and headquarters under the UNHCR 2024 annual programme budget, amounting to $\$ 10,621.7$ million (A/AC.96/74/5),

Takes note of the increase in the UNHCR annual budget for 2024 at a current total of $\$ 10,765.4$ million as of 31 January 2024, representing the sum of the original budget of $\$ 10,621.7$ million and supplementary budget of $\$ 143.7$ million;

Recognizes that emergencies and unforeseen activities unfolding in 2024 may result in the need for additional or expanded supplementary budgets and that additional resources, over and above those for existing budgets, would be needed to meet such needs, and

Urges member States to continue to respond generously with flexible and unearmarked contributions, in the spirit of solidarity and in a timely manner, to the High Commissioner's appeal for resources to meet in full the annual budget for 2024.
