- 50th Anniversary of the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness – 30 August 2011
- 150th Anniversary of the birth of Fridtjof Nansen, First League of Nations High Commissioner for Refugees – 11 October 2011

Objectives of commemorations

Strengthen the existing protection regime and promote a new protection dynamic

2 Achieve greater support for the statelessness conventions, better mapping of the problem and new ways to respond

 Raise public awareness and build solidarity with refugees and stateless people



Major themes of commemorations

New forms of displacement

 International cooperation and burden sharing

Statelessness





Ministerial-level Meeting

- 7-8 December 2011
- Culminating event of the commemorations
- All Member States of the United Nations
- IGOs, UN agencies, NGOs and regional institutions as observers

Desired outcomes:

 Pledges by States (and possibly regional organizations and NGOs)
 Ministerial Communiqué





State Pledges

- Voluntary, State-driven process
- Opportunity for States to identify issues and challenges of greatest importance to them
- Could be made individually and/or collectively
- Organizations/NGOs could also make pledges (e.g. OSCE)



- Specific, action-oriented and to the extent possible, measurable
- Linked to the goals of commemorations
- Designed to impact concretely and positively the actual situation of refugees, stateless people and other people of concern
- Forward-looking when it comes to new challenges



Types of pledges envisaged

- Ratify or accede to the Conventions, or lift reservations
- Amend or introduce legislation or policies
- Resolve refugee or statelessness situations
- Respond to operational issues and challenges
- Address regional challenges
- Address issues facing women and girls (informed by Regional Dialogues)



Preparing the pledges

- Three preparatory meetings of all States:
 - 4 March, 24 June and 22 September
 - In June, all States were briefed in their regional groupings about, *inter alia*, the pledges process
- Additional Guidance Note to Support the State Pledges Process:
 - Sets out some areas in which States might consider making pledges
 - Available on UNHCR website in Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish



Progress on making pledges

- Several States have already acceded:
 - Panama to 1954 and 1961 Conventions
 - Nauru to 1951 Convention
 - Philippines to 1954 Convention
- A number of other accessions are in the pipeline, particularly in Europe and Americas
- Regional pledge : Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Serbia



Progress on making pledges

- States have indicated that they are considering pledges in areas such as:
 - Alternatives to detention
 - Vulnerable populations
 - Statelessness
 - Climate change and displacement
 - Documentation
 - Combating discrimination, racism & xenophobia
 - Improving RSD and asylum procedures
 - Addressing protracted refugee situations
 - Particular displacement situations (e.g. Afghans in Iran)



Pledges and 'Resettlement'

ATCR provide an opportunity:

- To reflect on a potential 'group' pledge around resettlement
- To consider potential individual State pledges regarding resettlement
- To give resettlement its proper place in the commemorations, especially by focusing on durable solutions.
