

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



- · Respond to the needs of refugees and host communities, yielding sustained and positive benefits for them
- Be developed in partnership with other stakeholders, including refugees and host populations
- Consider age, gender, disability, and diversity
- Have the potential to be adapted, replicated, and/or broadened in scale
- Highlight opportunities to maximise the effective and efficient use of resources
- Inspire or form the basis of contributions to be announced at the Global Refugee Forums in 2019 and beyond



The Three-Year Strategy: an important component of the Global Compact on Refugees (GCR)

Expansion of access to third country solutions for refugees is one of the four objectives of the GCR (GCR, paragraph 7) The development of a **threeyear strategy (2019 – 2021)** is envisaged in the GCR to:

increase the pool of resettlement places, including countries not already participating in global resettlement efforts

consolidate emerging resettlement programmes Increase the availability and predictability of complementary pathways for admission of refugees



The Three-Year Strategy (2019-2021)

on Resettlement and Complementary Pathways

To achieve the GCR objective of expanding 3rd country solutions, the Strategy is:

A multi-stakeholder strategy led by UNHCR that promotes a whole-of-society approach

Anchored in an overall vision to expand resettlement and complementary pathways

Integrated within a comprehensive refugee response approach

A truly multi-stakeholder consultative process was pursued to develop the Strategy

+ 90 stakeholders consulted Stakeholders included States, NGOs, private sector, academia, faithbased actors, refugees and other UN agencies

+40 written contributions received

The Strategy has an ambitious yet realistic vision


Third country solutions for 3 million refugees by the end of 2028



VISION STATEMENT

Third country solutions for refugees are expanded so that by the end of 2028, 3 million refugees benefit from effective protection and solutions through resettlement (1 million) in 50 resettlement countries and complementary pathways (2 million).



The Global Refugee Forum: A platform to galvanize support for the Strategy through commitments and pledges

1. More actors

- ·Engaging new countries in resettlement and complementary pathways
- Financial and technical support to new and emerging resettlement countries, including through supporting the new UNHCR-IOM initiative (CRISP)
- Engagement of an expanded range of stakeholders in growing resettlement and complementary pathways

2. More places

- Expanding the **size of existing** resettlement programmes through making commitments to sustainably grow programmes
- Establishing or expanding community sponsorship programmes, humanitarian admission programmes or humanitarian visas
- Establishing or expanding complementary pathways and facilitating refugee access to family, work and education pathways

3. Better protection and quality

- Expanding diversity and responsiveness of programmes
- •Support the integration of refugees, including through policy changes and engaging local communities
- Including protection-safeguards pathways to solutions in complementary pathways
