The Regional Humanitarian Logistics Hub is overseen by the UNHCR Representation to Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan. In 2022, UNHCR requires \$8.8 million for its operations across the four countries. As of 08 December 2022, the operation is 56% funded.

Prepositioning for Rapid Delivery

With support from the Government of Uzbekistan, UNHCR established the Regional Humanitarian Logistics Hub in October 2021 as part of its response to the Afghanistan emergency.

Located in the Termez Cargo Centre – 2km from the Uzbekistan-Afghanistan border – the hub enables UNHCR to rapidly replenish local stockpiles and be more agile in its humanitarian response, while reducing costs and risks associated with carrying large inventory in each country affected by the Afghanistan situation.

The hub is capable of same day, onsite processing of all necessary documentation for shipments and deliveries to Afghanistan, Pakistan, other Central Asian countries, and beyond – including to Ukraine.

In 12 months of operations, the hub has sent 217 trucks of the essential relief items that people need most in the first days after they are forced to flee, including sleeping mats, tarpaulins, heavy duty buckets, blankets, stainless steel kitchen sets, and portable solar LED lamps.

Providing vulnerable refugees and internally displaced people with these core relief items supports their dignity, health, privacy and self-reliance, reducing further protection risks.



Responding to Emergencies

UNHCR supports government, UN and other humanitarian partners to plan and prepare responses to forced internal displacement and refugee influx emergencies, within and into the sub-region.

The [2022 Afghanistan Situation Regional Refugee Response Plan](#) seeks to support host governments to meet the needs of Afghans of varying statuses, including refugees, asylum-seekers and undocumented people, as well as host communities, and potential new arrivals.

Protecting Refugees

With partners and authorities across the region, UNHCR advocates for safe and efficient access to asylum and non-refoulement, supporting Governments to develop and strengthen their national asylum systems to meet international protection standards.

UNHCR promotes local integration of refugees, and advocates for them to have access to public services, including social protection, health, education and employment.
