

UNHCR Jordan - Assistance and Protection in 2008



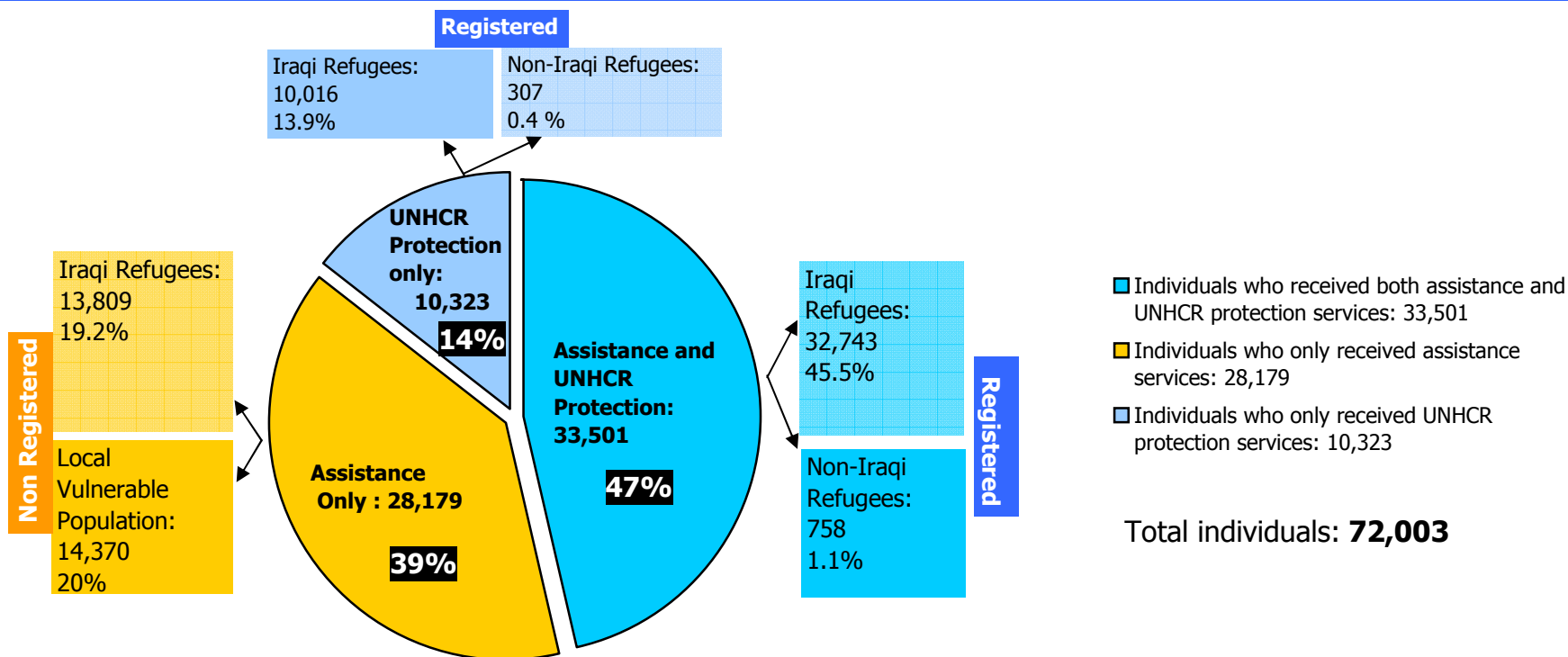

- In 2008, UNHCR and its 24 implementing partners provided services to 72,080 individuals. Targeted assistance was provided to 33,501 individuals who registered with UNHCR and 28,179 individuals who did not register with UNHCR.
- In addition, 10,400 individuals received UNHCR protection services such as registration or resettlement, but did not seek or were not eligible for material assistance.
- As part of the strategy in an urban context to promote coexistence and tolerance up to 25% of beneficiaries may be locally-affected populations such as vulnerable or poor Jordanians.

Individuals who received more than one kind of assistance were only counted once.

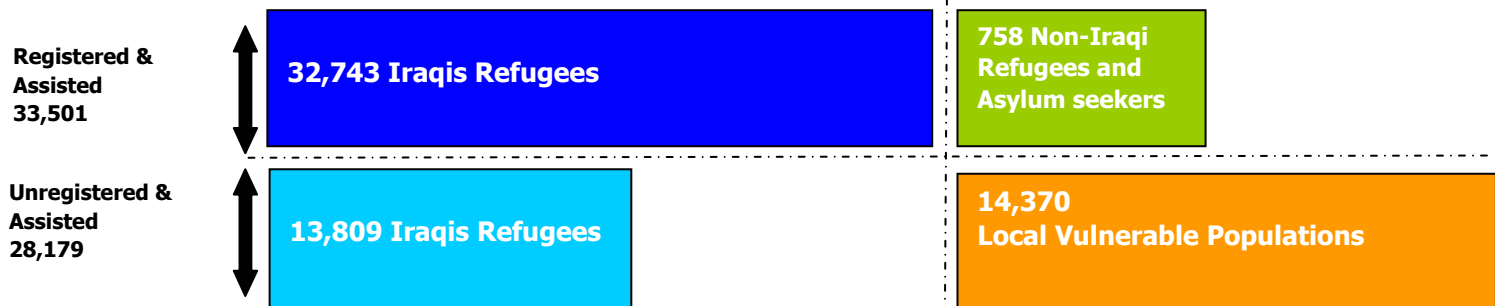

Received Assistance or UNHCR Protection Services in 2008

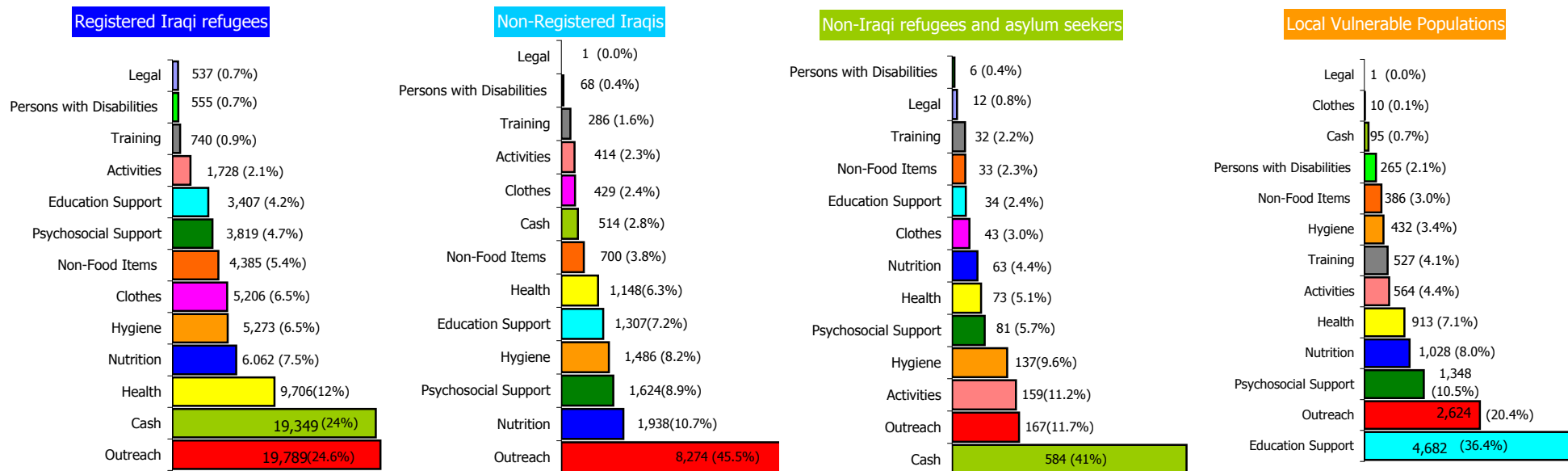


UNHCR Protection services include resettlement, registration, voluntary repatriation and SGBV and legal counseling.

Breakdown of Sectors of Assistance for Direct Beneficiaries in 2008 (Registered and Non-Registered Iraqi Refugees, Non-Iraqi Refugees and Asylum Seekers, and Local Vulnerable Populations)



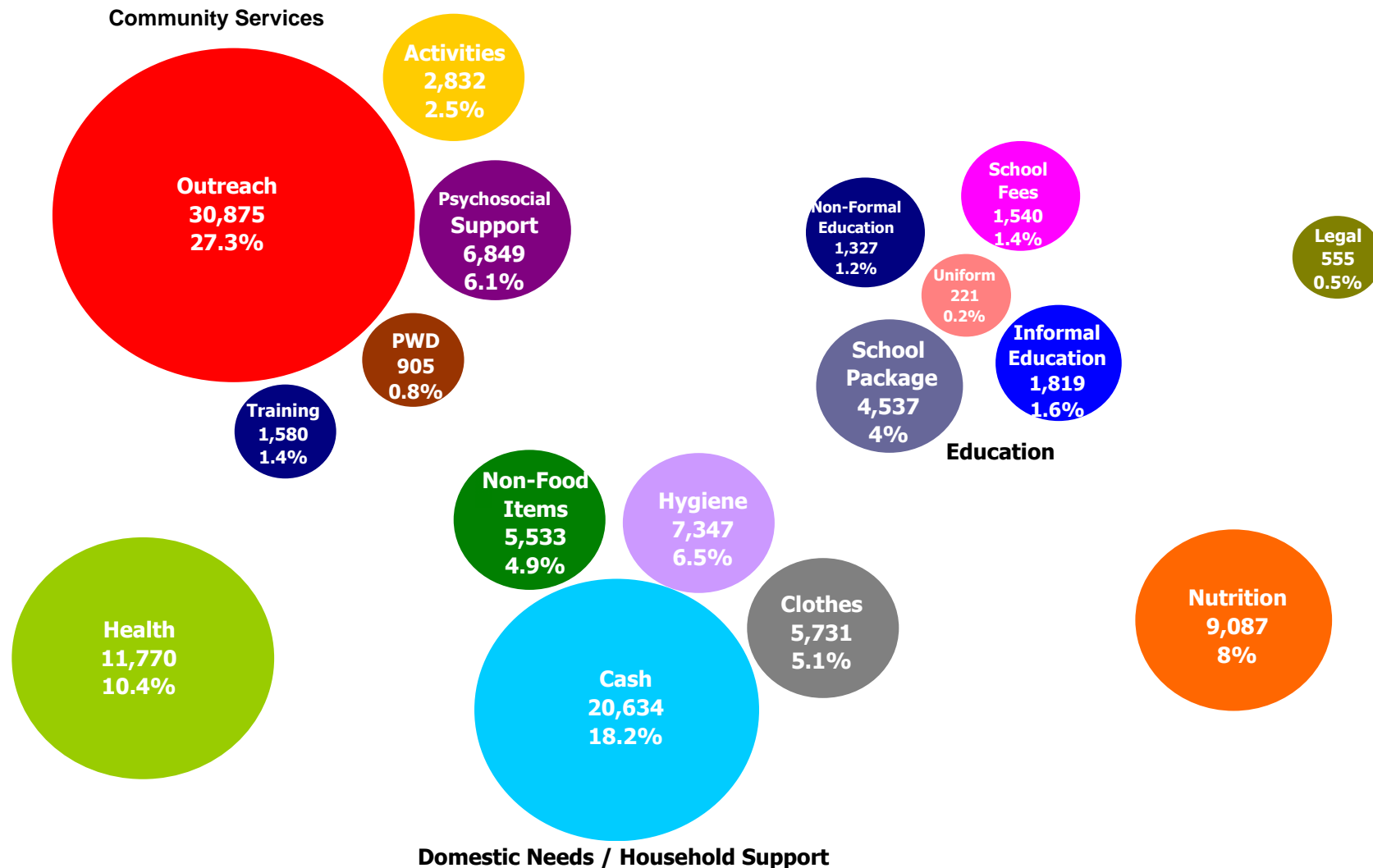
- A total of 46,552 Iraqis were assisted, of which 32,743 were registered and 13,809 were not registered. Iraqi dependents of other nationalities are counted as Iraqis.
- UNHCR also assisted 758 non-Iraqi refugees and asylum seekers from Somalia, Sudan, and other countries.
- Local vulnerable populations, a total of 14,370 individuals, were also assisted as part of the strategy in an urban context.



- Registered Iraqis are primarily supported through outreach (19,789 individuals) and cash assistance (19,349 individuals). Although 19,349 individuals are linked to families that received cash assistance, a few thousand are not registered with UNHCR. As of the end of 2008, all people who receive cash assistance must be registered with UNHCR. UNHCR does not provide cash assistance to unregistered people, but a few thousand people may benefit from cash assistance received by their registered family members.
- Non-registered Iraqis are mainly supported through outreach (8,274 individuals or 45.5% of their assistance).
- Non-Iraqis refugees and asylum seekers primarily receive cash assistance. These 758 other persons of concern include refugees from Somalia, Sudan and other countries.
- Local vulnerable populations receive primarily education. This is part of UNHCR's strategy in an urban context to promote coexistence and tolerance. The three other significant sectors of assistance are outreach, psychosocial support and nutrition.

Sector and Sub-Sector Assistance Breakdown in 2008

- Outreach, cash, health and nutrition assistance were the largest sub-sectors of assistance in 2008.
- Outreach workers contacted a total of 30,875 individuals, of which 8,274 were non-registered Iraqi refugees.
- Cash assistance was provided to 20,634 direct beneficiaries.
- Health services were provided to 11,770 and nutrition to 9,087 direct beneficiaries.
