As we look back on another year of challenges and triumphs through this newsletter, we would like to share how your contributions have made a real difference in the lives of countless individuals and communities.



When staff from the municipal government came bearing news of a free birth registration activity scheduled nearby, 33-year-old mother of four Hamsiya did not hesitate. "They said that we had to register in person, that we could not send someone else. I am here because I must register my children, I have four and they are all unregistered."

Hamsiya came with her one-year-old in tow, taking a boat early in the morning which brought them from their home in Barangay Suligan all the way to the nearby island of Barangay Bukut Umus, the location of the municipal hall of Tabuan Lasa, where UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency, together with partners Ministry of Social Services and Development (MSSD) of the Bang-Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) and UNICEF held a three-day actual birth registration activity. The team facilitated the handover to the local government of education materials as well as equipment that would aid in the digitization of the birth registration process and improve the capacity of local civil registrars (LCRs) even in far-flung communities.

Hamsiya's children are part of the 1,377 Sama Bajaus and unregistered children in the context of forced displacement due to armed conflict and their families who received their birth certificates during a series of birth registration activities held in Maguindanao, Basilan, Sulu and Tawi-Tawi in 2023. The activities were held as part of the #IBelong Campaign to End Statelessness and in line with the UNHCR-UNICEF Joint Strategy for Addressing Childhood Statelessness which has helped more than 4,000 individuals receive birth certificates since 2019. The effort also contributes to the Philippines' implementation of its National Action Plan to End Statelessness.

I am happy because they will now have birth certificates. It was very difficult to register their birth because we are unemployed and could not afford to process their delayed birth registration.

But I had to find a way, because the school requires it and might no longer accept my children if they do not have birth certificates. My eldest will be grade 3 and my other child will be grade 1 this year."

With your support, a total of 1,377 Sama Bajau and unregistered children in the context of forced displacement due to armed conflict and their families in four far-flung municipalities in Maguindanao, Basilan, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi received their birth certificates in 2023.



Aside from providing support during the conduct of actual birth registration, local government units also received equipment for digitization of the processes at the Local Civil Registrar's level, as well as advocacy campaign materials that highlight the importance of birth registration.

Before, only around 20% of the people of Tabuan Lasa had access to birth registration, being one of the most remote municipalities. Now we have this birth registration as a long-time program where we envision newborns to be registered immediately after birth."

# PH submits more than 24 new pledges in 2nd Global Refugee Forum

New and renewed pledges sustain Philippines' strong commitment to addressing forced displacement



The Philippines has once again demonstrated its strong commitment to enhancing the rights, welfare, and inclusion of the forcibly displaced, stateless, and those at risk of statelessness and ultimately, to leaving no one behind, as it submitted more than 24 new pledges during the second Global Refugee Forum (GRF) in Geneva, Switzerland.

Undersecretary Raul Vasquez of the Department of Justice and head of the country's delegation to the 2023 GRF underscored that the new pledges from the Philippines focused on protection, solutions and inclusion, particularly in enhancing the access of the forcibly displaced, stateless and those at risk of statelessness to social protection, greater economic inclusion, refining policies and laws, and improving data in addition to the country's ongoing efforts to end statelessness and providing access to higher education to Rohingya youth through the Complementary Pathways Programme.

As each pledge and each crisis situation increasingly demand more from us, we should not forget the most fundamental of our considerations: the rights, inclusion, safety, and welfare of all displaced persons."

Guada Tagalog Pante is a mother of two, visual artist, energy healer, and life coach who is passionate about creating and sharing art that helps and heals others. She is also one of UNHCR's loyal monthly donors, helping protect people forced to flee since 2019.

She remembers that when the UNHCR cause was first explained to her, she felt a calling to contribute in her own simple way. "I've always wanted to give back and share my blessings, and I feel God sent me UNHCR as an answer," she shares. Deeply moved by UNHCR's mission to aid displaced families and children in finding safety towards rebuilding their lives in dignity, Guada became a steadfast supporter of UNHCR.

"I really commend UNHCR for helping displaced families and children find new homes or at least, with our donations, have something to start with their new life. The world is at war and so many innocent lives are affected. Even if I am far away, I feel that I am also taking part in changing the lives of these victims through my donations," Guada says.

The discovery of her most rewarding experience as a donor came when the challenges of the pandemic brought her own set of hurdles as a business owner. Guada realized that even during the most challenging times, she can still find a way to give.

"Never did it occur to me to suspend my donations because I know how valuable every penny is and I just somehow made it work... It gives me peace knowing that I am doing something good to someone out there. That I know my savings are going to save somebody's life," Guada shares.

More than three years after she made that first donation, Guada remains steadfast in her commitment to support the most vulnerable, and is grateful for the opportunity to help and extend her love to those who need it most.

As a mother, Guada's hope for displaced families. goes beyond finding shelter – she hopes they can also find a better home, livelihood, and environment to raise their children.

"I hope displaced families heal from the trauma and find a way to still follow their dreams and start anew despite the challenge they experienced. May they still find the light in the darkness and use it to find peace in their situation. May more people help them find their way back to a beautiful life."

No matter how busy or challenging life may seem, Guada remains to be a shining example of generosity and compassion, contributing to changing the lives of displaced families and also inspiring others to do the same.
