UNHCR supports national authorities in ensuring a favourable **protection space** for forcibly displaced and stateless people in Greece, and provide information on rights, procedures and obligations.

UNHCR assists refugees and asylum-seekers, including with **legal aid and referrals to specialized services**, while supporting the government with advice and expertise on asylum, reception and **durable solutions**.

Through livelihoods employability programmes, vocational projects, job fairs and upskilling projects, UNHCR supported **390** refugees **access employment** in the first half of 2023.

Enhancing Refugee Self-Reliance

UNHCR collaborates with 11 major municipalities across Greece to support their promoting refugee integration. This involves strengthening municipal expertise and work towards including refugees into municipal service provision. UNHCR also works with NGO which promote refugee **employability**, provide language classes and support document issuance, aiming towards refugee inclusion in the labour market. Additionally, partner NGOs connect refugees with employment opportunities in the private sector and offer vocational trainings.

HIGHLIGHTS

Legal Assistance

UNHCR supported **2,360** refugees and asylum-seekers through **legal assistance** so far in 2023.

Helpline

UNHCR reached some **1,460** people through the **protection Helpline**. Callers predominantly contacted UNHCR for legal advice, information about asylum procedures and accommodation.

Street Outreach Initiative

Since March 2023, UNHCR has been assisting refugees and asylum-seekers in central Athens by identifying needs, providing information and facilitating referrals to specialized services when needed. The key challenges refugees face includes **lack of housing**, lack of **basic necessities**, especially amongst families with children, and limited access to information and **legal aid** for asylum procedures.



More Than a Job – a Warm Embrace for Refugees

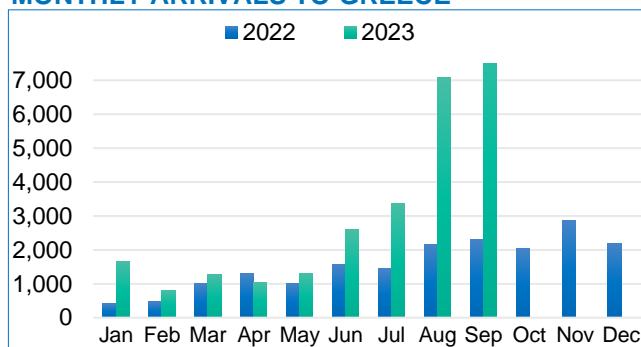

Key Priorities

- **Protection:** UNHCR utilizes its dedicated Helpline and field presence to identify and refer people to specialized services in a timely manner.
- **People with specific needs:** Through referrals to specialized partners, UNHCR connects vulnerable refugees and those most at risk – including people living with chronic illnesses, survivors of GBV, and unaccompanied and separated children with relevant support services. UNHCR also links refugees with disabilities to the national social protection system to benefit from existing safety nets.
- **Inclusion:** Working with refugee communities, UNHCR identifies refugees' skills and experience while mapping intentions and needs. Together with the Government, NGO partners, the private sector and municipalities, UNHCR connects refugees to jobs and helps them acquire documentation necessary to live and work in Greece. UNHCR also offers advisory support to national authorities to avoid administrative hurdles hindering refugee inclusion.
- **Legal aid:** UNHCR offers personalized legal aid through partners to ensure refugees and asylum-seekers have unhindered access to their rights.
- **Advocacy:** UNHCR engages with relevant authorities and actors to address key issues impacting refugees and asylum-seekers' access to rights—including access to territory and asylum procedures—to catalyse legal and policy reforms.
- **Promoting social cohesion:** UNHCR strives to raise awareness of the refugees' plight among the host population, foster solidarity and cultivate partnerships with the private sector to mobilize wider support.
- **Institutional strengthening:** UNHCR deploys staff and provides technical advice and expertise to strengthen State systems and expertise on asylum, reception and durable solutions.

Working with Partners

- UNHCR works primarily with the National Government, municipalities as well as EU institutions, UN agencies, I/NGOs, refugees, local communities and the private sector.

Statelessness

- Greece has acceded to the 1954 Statelessness Convention but has yet to accede to the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness.
- UNHCR has been working with the Government with a view to establish a statelessness determination procedure, data collection and issue legislation on citizenship. In cooperation with the municipality of Athens, UNHCR also provides classes and support to those preparing to sit the Greek citizenship exams.

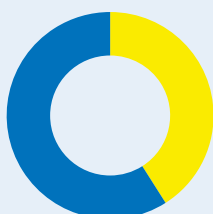
