HISTORY

UNHCR has been a friend of Bangladesh since 1971, providing lifesaving aid to some 10 million refugees forced to flee during the Liberation War.

Today, UNHCR and partners manage
16 camps in Cox's Bazar, including
Nayapara and Kutupalong Registered
Camps, plus the island of Bhasan Char,
supporting the Government of
Bangladesh to provide essential services
and meet the protection needs of one
million Rohingya refugees, including
special services for women, children and
persons with disabilities. Most arrived in
2017, fleeing persecution, large-scale
violence and human rights violations.

Support is additionally extended to host communities while continuously working towards solutions to ensure that refugees can return in a safe, dignified, voluntary and sustainable way once conditions in Myanmar allow.



KEY UPDATES

- 2023 JOINT RESPONSE PLAN (JRP): As of 31 December, the 2023 JRP was 50% funded with USD 440 million received against an overall appeal of USD 876 million. This compares to 69% funding received against an appeal of 881 million in 2022. Read more.
- MISSING AT SEA: Some 569 Rohingya were reported to have perished or gone missing last year in South-East Asian waters, with nearly 4,500 embarking on deadly sea journeys – a significant increase on previous years. The number reported missing or dead is the highest since 2014. Estimates show one Rohingya was reported to have died or gone missing for every eight people attempting the journey in 2023. - FIRE IN CAMP 5: On 7 January, a massive fire broke out in Camp 5, a UNHCR-managed camp. The fire took over three hours to extinguish, with more than 200 Rohingya volunteers serving as first responders. Almost 1,000 shelters were damaged/destroyed, affecting some 900 households (5,000 people) including 3,500 children. Damage was also reported to 31 community facilities including learning centres and child-friendly spaces, 213 WASH structures, and 55 solar streetlights. Emergency firefighting vehicles could not reach the area as there is no vehicular access road, slowing the response time. Dry canal beds and lack of fire breaks in the congested area also impeded the fire response.
- REDESIGNED SITE PLAN: With support from the Camp 5 Camp-in-Charge, UNHCR designed a new site plan for the fire-affected community, with additional access roads and optimized locations of shelters and facilities. The plan implements an integrated WASH/Shelter model, with one WASH block for every 3-5 shelters. The model increases accessibility for the elderly, women and girls, people with disabilities and other special needs. It mitigates gender-based violence (GBV) and protection risks, and promotes health, dignity and ownership, while reducing exposure to unsanitary practices within living spaces.
- COMMUNITY DIALOGUES: 65 refugees (25 women) took part in five community
 consultations organized in five camps. Safety and security in the camps remain the primary
 concern for refugees, followed by food distribution, increases in GBV incidents, child labour
 and child marriage (i.e. negative coping mechanisms due to lack of income), and healthcare
 concerns. Refugee feedback/concerns were shared with the relevant actors.
- REGISTRATION VERFICATION EXERCISE: In January, the exercise to verify and update the
 data of refugees in the two registered camps was completed. Registration details of 35,340
 individuals (8,004 households) were updated, reaching 86% of the target.
- NEW SCHOOL YEAR IN REGISTERED CAMPS: UNHCR's new education partner CODEC launched the new academic year in Nayapara and Kutupalong registered camps with programmes for early childhood education (ECE) and primary and secondary levels (up to grade 8). As of January, 6,068 children are enrolled (2,563 children in ECE, 3,229 in primary grades and 276 in secondary grades), 51.6% of whom are girls. Materials have been adapted from the English curriculum rather than the Myanmar curriculum, to better reflect the needs of the registered refugees.



STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

1. BASIC RIGHTS, PROTECTION & EDUCATION

Refugee rights are respected, and they have access to education and protection, including protection against gender-based violence.

2. ADEQUATE LIVING CONDITIONS IN A GREEN ENVIRONMENT

Essential and sustainable services (including safe shelters, health, nutrition, WASH, energy) are ensured, and the environment is protected.

3. SKILLS & CAPACITY BUILDING TO SUPPORT DURABLE SOLUTIONS

Work toward sustainable solutions, with voluntary repatriation at the centre, supported by skills development, livelihoods and capacity building for refugees.

4. DIVERSIFIED FUNDING & PARTNERSHIPS

Partnerships with development and private sector actors to innovate, support and localize operations.

5. CREATING A POSITIVE NARRATIVE

Lead the narrative on the Rohingya refugee response and improve public attitudes toward the Rohingya.

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- VOCATIONAL SKILLS DEVELOPMENT & PRODUCTION: In January, 3,275 refugees (1,823 women) were enrolled in vocational skills training; 399 refugee women were engaged in underwear and sanitary napkin production, and 131 refugee women engaged in jute bag production. Meanwhile, UNICEF confirmed a plan to use the underwear and sanitary napkins produced at the UNHCR-supported centres for its female hygiene kits, contributing to the project's cost recovery. A fifth production centre will be established in February, increasing production capacity.
- BIOGAS ACCIDENTS & SAFETY AWARENESS: Three biogas/septic tank related incidents occurred in December and January in Cox's Bazar, resulting in 11 injuries (ten children and one adult) and one adult fatality. The incidents prompted an audit of all biogas plants, involving consultations with 175 biogas users and their neighbours, The audit recommended decommissioning 13 out of 82 biogas facilities (all in registered camps). Meanwhile, awareness campaigns on biogas-related risks and hazards were conducted, and UNHCR is reviewing occupational hazards for community volunteers and will conduct targeted training and awareness of partner staff and volunteers.
- PRESSURE COOKER STUDY: The second round of the study identified further energy savings through use of pressure cookers, with smaller households able to save more. The research findings are being analyzed and finalized in the coming weeks, and will be reflected in the future programming.
- UPSWING IN FIRE INCIDENTS: In January, 80 fire incidents (two major ones and 78 minor) were reported, compared to 37 minor incidents during the same period in 2023. Injuries, damages to shelters and other properties were recorded. The cause of 44 incidents (55%) could not be established, while the remaining fires were attributed to different, unconfirmed factors including suspected arson.
- CAMPAIGN AGAINST SCABIES: In January, 32,539 refugees ages two years and up received the recommended two doses of medicine in a mass drug campaign against scabies, and 32,006 refugees received their first dose, reaching 99% of target.
- MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH CARD: UNHCR piloted a Maternal and Child Health Card to
 ensure proper healthcare documentation and monitoring during pregnancy, childbirth, and
 the first two years of a child's life. The pilot is ongoing at select health facilities in 13 camps
 and will be completed in February. A wider rollout, in coordination with Health Sector
 partners, is planned for the second quarter, aiming for more effective health service delivery
 through reducing multiple consultations.
- MISSION REPORT: After a pause on missions in the lead up to Bangladesh's general election on 7 January, UNHCR hosted or assisted eight visits from donors and partners to Cox's Bazar camps and Bhasan Char, including the USA, the UK, and ADB.
- FUNDING UPDATE: As of 31 January, the UNHCR Bangladesh operation was 18% funded against an operating plan of USD 275 million. A top up was received from the European Union in January.
