Operational Context

India continues to be a generous host to refugees and asylum-seekers from across the region and beyond. UNHCR works in close coordination with the Government of India, NITI Aayog and other UN agencies in fulfilling its mandate of ensuring access protection, solutions, and humanitarian assistance to persons forced to flee.

Civil society organizations, working in partnership with UNHCR, are at the forefront of the refugee response ensuring that assistance reaches the most vulnerable within the overall objective of "leaving no one behind". Partnership agreements are in place with eight national NGOs.

To ensure that refugees are included in work on UN's Sustainable Development Goals, UNHCR maintains close engagement with the UN Country Teams in India and the Maldives. In 2025, resilience building, and selfreliance remain top priorities in furthering UNHCR's efforts to support refugees and asylum seekers.



FUNDING AS OF 28 FEBRUARY 2025




REFUGEES AND ASYLUM-SEEKERS AS OF 28 FEBRUARY 2025

Integrating refugee protection into education

Loyola College and Women's Christian College in Chennai, India, are the first institutions to adopt an academic curriculum on "Refugees, Statelessness, and Mixed Migration" developed jointly by the Loyola Institute of Social Science Training and Research (LISSTAR), Loyola College, the Tamil Nadu Dr Ambedkar Law University (TNDALU), and UNHCR. This aims to deepen students' understanding of the dynamics of forced displacement, the rights of refugees and stateless persons and approaches to empowering refugees and building resilience.

Developed through a consultative process involving over 70 academicians from various state universities in Tamil Nadu, the curriculum is designed for students studying law, political science, international relations, and English literature. It has been presented to arts and science universities and colleges across Tamil Nadu for approval, with Loyola College and Women's Christian College set to implement it in the upcoming academic year.

Dr. Bernard D'Sami, the workshop coordinator and Senior Fellow at LISSTAR, highlighted the curriculum's focus on refugee resilience: "Learners at the UG and PG levels will explore the causes and consequences of forced migration and the legal protections available. Importantly, the curriculum emphasizes the resilience and strength demonstrated by refugees."

This initiative aligns with the Global Compact on Refugees adopted by the UN General Assembly in 2018, promoting multi-stakeholder cooperation and a whole-of-society approach to addressing the needs of displaced communities. The curriculum's introduction in the 2025-2026 academic year marks a significant step in integrating refugee studies into higher education, fostering empathy and understanding among students.

"Specialized courses like these enable students to develop a profound understanding of displacement issues. Education is indeed a powerful tool for social change," said a workshop participant while calling for a better understanding and empathy among students on refugee issues.
