

OPERATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS

team with the migration situation in Djibouti, and how to support UNHCR in its various refugee support programs. On arrival in Obock, the team was received by the UNHCR and ONARS camp manager as well as the deputy prefect of the Obock region. Mr Gene also met the leaders of the Yemeni and Eritrean communities living on the site. The Program manager also visited UNHCR offices and had a productive meeting with a multifunction team on Wednesday 26 March.

REFUGEE RESPONSE

The WFP, in collaboration with UNHCR and ONARS distributes food Holl-Holl refugee village. On 25 March, the WFP, in collaboration with the UNHCR and ONARS, distributed food and cash in Holl-Holl refugee village, as part of the monthly food assistance distribution. More than 6 000 refugees are expected to be served. The same activity is planned for the village of Ali-Addeh and Markazi site in the coming days.

The National Agency for Employment, Training and Professional Integration (ANEFIP), in partnership with UNHCR and ONARS, provides training for 150 young refugees and asylum seekers. On March 26, the ANEFIP, in collaboration with ONARS and UNHCR, launched soft skills training sessions for 150 young refugees and asylum seekers residing in three refugee sites including 50 in Ali-Addeh, 50 in Holl-Holl and 50 in Markazi. The training modules offered include prevention of sexual harassment, CV and application letter writing, as well as a series of confidence-building activities.

UNHCR and its partners discussed the continuity of the protection activities in Markazi. On 20 March, UNHCR and its partners held a coordination meeting on protection activities in Markazi. The aim of the meeting was to ensure the continuity of protection activities in the village of Markazi. Protection partners and field staff took part in the meeting, the agenda covered key points such as registration, gender-based violence (GBV) activities, child protection, community-based protection, document management, as well as the distribution of kerosene.
