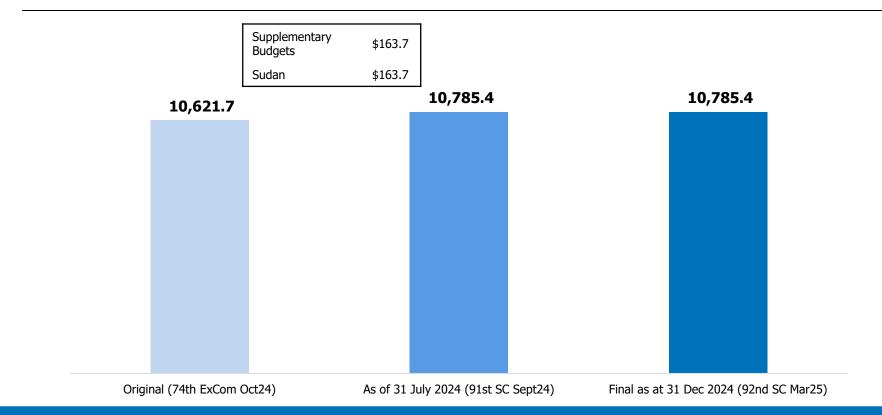

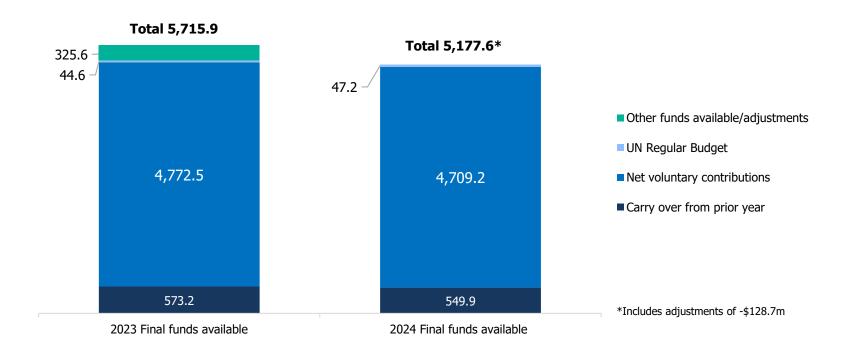


2024 final budget reached **\$10.8 billion**



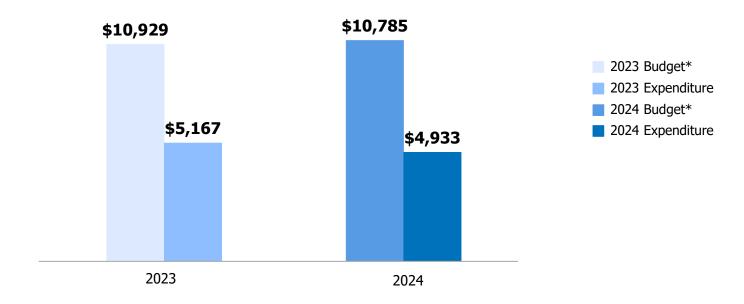


2023 – 2024 Total funds available





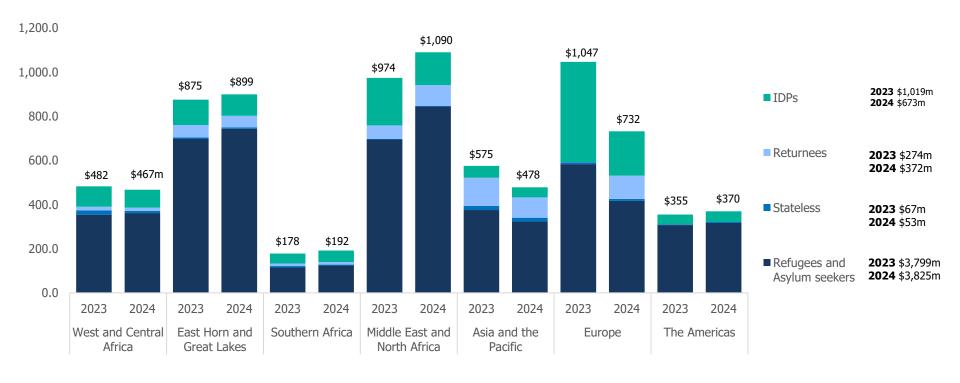
2023-2024 expenditure vs budget

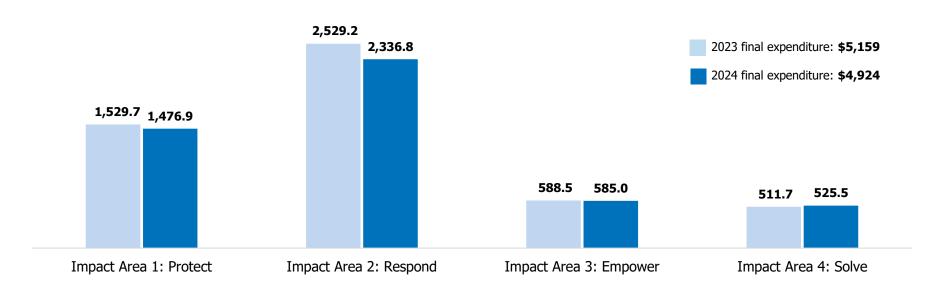


2023-2024 expenditure by region and population group

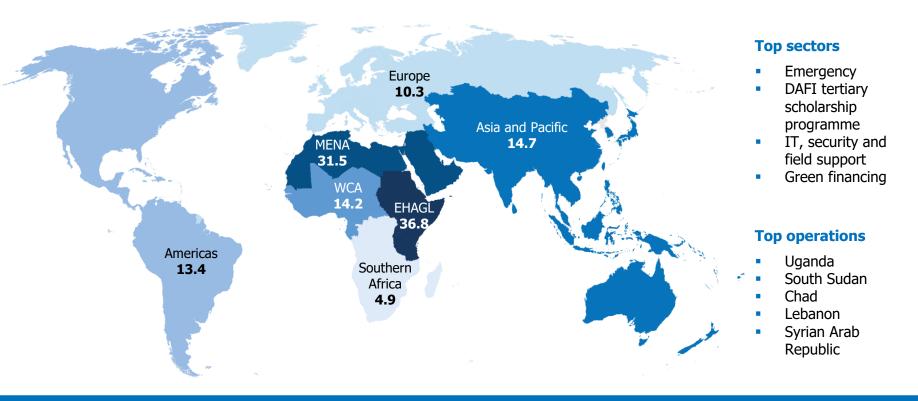


2024 expenditures by outcome area were at slightly lower levels compared to 2023

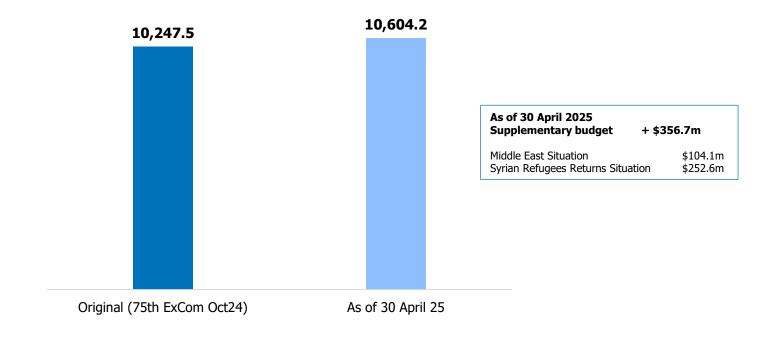

Update on the Syria returns situation



7.4 million internally displaced persons in the Syrian Arab Republic.



Nearly 500,000 refugee returnees and over 1,200,000 internally displaced persons have returned to their homes since December 2024.

Most of those returning come from neighboring countries such as Jordan, Lebanon, Türkiye, Iraq, and Egypt.

- Through Facilitated Voluntary Return and Transport Assistance programme, UNHCR provides transport to returnee families at key border crossing points.
- In the country, UNHCR continues its robust protection monitoring, supporting access to essential services for vulnerable populations, distributing nonfood items kits across all 14 governorates, and providing protection response, legal support and mental health and psychosocial interventions.
- UNHCR's requirements for the Syrian Arab Republic are
 15 per cent funded, with \$84 million received as at end May of the \$575 million needed for 2025.

Where we are today

Programmatic effects

- Maintain protection advocacy in key countries with large populations in need of international protection.
- Ensure presence to continue engagement and emergency response capacity.
- Emphasize delivery for those most vulnerable despite challenging trade-offs.
- These adjustments affected both country operations and headquarters.

In $2025 - \sim 185$ modifications and closures to country offices, sub-offices and other types of operational presence

Reductions are being implemented in phases to ensure continued engagement, including through:

- Merged or multi-country offices.
- Conversion of country offices to national offices.
- Co-location with UN agencies, partners, or host governments.
- Closure or merger of sub-national offices, such as sub-offices, field offices and field units.

Approximate staffing reductions, as realized in 2026:

- Country operations staffing will be reduced by 30%.
- Headquarters staffing will be reduced by 31%.
- Regional Bureau staffing will be reduced by 44%, higher due to closure of one Regional Bureau.
