

Context

UNHCR is closely monitoring displacement and protection situation in South Sudan, following an sharp escalation of violence and insecurity since February 2025.

UNHCR CORE

While the conflict initially intensified in Upper Nile State-particularly in Nasir, CHAD Ulang, and Baliet Counties—and in Fangak County, Jonglei State, it has since spread to other parts of the country, triggering population movements both within South Sudan and across its borders.

Since March, some 127,000 people have sought refuge in neighbouring countries, including an estimated 23,000 in the DRC, about 35,000 in Ethiopia, 48,000 in Sudan, and over 21,000 in Uganda. Within South Sudan, OCHA reports that approximately 135,000 people have been newly displaced in Upper Nile and Jonglei States.


