	We acknowledge the strengths highlighted in the evaluation, including UNHCR's leadership in protection coordination, its responsiveness to displacement dynamics, and its efforts to localize humanitarian action. At the same time, we recognize the areas for improvement, especially in strengthening monitoring and evaluation systems, enhancing communication with stakeholders, and ensuring sustainability through institutional partnerships.
General comments on the evaluation:	The recommendations are largely aligned with our strategic priorities. However, we emphasize that UNHCR's role should remain facilitative and strategic—supporting government leadership, building local capacities, and fostering multi-stakeholder collaboration. This approach ensures that interventions are nationally owned, contextually appropriate, and sustainable in the long term.
	It is important to note that implementing the recommendations will require adequate resources; therefore, the completion of activities will be contingent upon their availability.
