## Operational Context

India continues to be a generous host to refugees and asylum-seekers from across the region and beyond. UNHCR works in close coordination with the Government of India, NITI Aayog and other UN agencies in fulfilling its mandate of ensuring access to protection, solutions, and humanitarian assistance to persons forced to flee.

Civil society organizations, working in partnership with UNHCR, are at the forefront of the refugee response ensuring that assistance reaches the most vulnerable within the overall objective of "leaving no one behind". Partnership agreements are in place with eight national NGOs.

To ensure that refugees are included in the UN's work on Sustainable Development Goals, UNHCR maintains close engagement with the UN Country Teams in India and the Maldives. In 2025, resilience building, and self-reliance remain top priorities in furthering UNHCR's efforts to support refugees and asylum seekers.








## REFUGEES AND ASYLUM-SEEKERS AS OF 31 August 2025

## Standing Together Through the Storm – Refugee Volunteers Join Flood Relief Efforts in Jammu

*In the wake of devastating floods in Jammu, refugees and asylum seekers joined hands with local communities — proving that compassion and solidarity flow stronger than any river.*

In August, Jammu witnessed one of its heaviest monsoon seasons in decades. Beginning with a devastating cloudburst in Chisot Village, Kishtwar, and followed by intense rainfall across the region, floods breached the banks of the River Tawi and submerged hundreds of homes in low-lying areas such as Gujjar Nagar, Rajinder Nagar, and Sunjawan. Landslides and infrastructure damage further compounded the crisis, leaving families displaced and communities struggling to recover.

Among those affected were refugee and asylum-seeker families living in Jammu. Forty-one households suffered damage, and twelve shelters were completely washed away. Despite their own losses, refugee community leaders quickly mobilized to support the district administration's relief efforts.

Starting 28 August, around 270 refugee volunteers participated daily for a week to help clean flood-affected areas, including Gujjar Nagar and Jhogi Ghat. Their work involved removing mud, silt, and debris from lanes and homes, clearing damaged household items, and helping restore accessibility for affected residents. By the end of the effort, 113 homes, one temple, and one cremation ground had been cleaned.

Through these collective efforts, refugee volunteers worked alongside local communities to support recovery and restoration in the flood-affected areas of Jammu. Their assistance significantly improved accessibility in locations that had initially been difficult for both government and non-government agencies to reach. This was "reciprocity in action" — refugees extending support to local communities in their time of need, just as those communities had once welcomed and shown compassion to them.
