## Operational Context

India continues to be a generous host to refugees and asylum-seekers from across the region and beyond. UNHCR works in close coordination with the Government of India, NITI Aayog and other UN agencies in fulfilling its mandate of ensuring access to protection, solutions, and humanitarian assistance to persons forced to flee.

Civil society organizations, working in partnership with UNHCR, are at the forefront of the refugee response ensuring that assistance reaches the most vulnerable within the overall objective of "leaving no one behind". Partnership agreements are in place with eight national NGOs.

To ensure that refugees are included in the UN's work on Sustainable Development Goals, UNHCR maintains close engagement with the UN Country Teams in India and the Maldives. In 2025, resilience building, and self-reliance remain top priorities in furthering UNHCR's efforts to support refugees and asylum seekers.






## REFUGEES AND ASYLUM-SEEKERS AS OF 31 October 2025

## Stitches that Build Connection

*How embroidery brought Afghan refugee women and Kutch artisans together*

In New Delhi, women artisans from Kutch, Gujarat and Afghanistan came together to share embroidery techniques, stories and traditions — transforming craft into a space for connection and collaboration.

Over the course of the exchange, mirrored Kutch motifs blended with delicate Afghan embroidery, as participants learned from one another and worked side by side. What began as shared practice gradually evolved into collaborative, market-ready pieces, reflecting days of learning, creativity and trust.

For Afghan refugee Parveen Kakkar, the initiative opened new livelihood opportunities. With support from UNHCR, she displayed and got an opportunity to market her embroidered products, earning income while strengthening her skills. "Working together feels like a cultural exchange," she says. "Our embroidery is different, yet connected."

Local artisans also found the experience enriching. Dharmila Ahir, an artisan leader from Kutch who heads a collective of 80 women, describes the exchange as meaningful and empowering. "We learned new techniques, created joint products and built friendships that will continue beyond the workshop," she shares.

Facilitated by the Indian Institute of Crafts and Design (IICD), Jaipur and supported by UNHCR India, the initiative strengthened technical skills, expanded market access and encouraged dialogue between refugee and host communities. By creating together, the women demonstrated how shared creativity can foster understanding, dignity and sustainable livelihoods — proving that sometimes, the strongest connections are stitched quietly, by hand.

Building on the success of this first phase, UNHCR India will seek funding for a second phase of the project, with a focus on developing specific, high-quality products for wider markets. Discussions are also underway with MADE51 to explore pathways for linking the initiative to global markets, while collaboration with IICD will continue to deepen design, production and market readiness. With these efforts, the project is set to be strengthened further in 2026, expanding opportunities for refugee and host-community artisans alike.
