# EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S PROGRAMME

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### UPDATE ON PROGRAMMES, BUDGETS AND FUNDING FOR 2004

### I. INTRODUCTION

1. The information presented in this update concerns UNHCR's programme requirements and funding situation as of August 2004. Annex I shows programme needs and funding requirements for the current year, as at 15 August 2004. It also provides for the first time, actual levels of expenditure in 2004; Annex II gives updated information on transfers so far in 2004 from the Operational Reserve-Category I; Annex III provides information on transfers from the Operational Reserve-Category II; Annex IV lists total contributions received as of 15 August for UNHCR programmes in 2004; Annex V shows the breakdown of contributions by NGOs, foundations and private donors to UNHCR programmes for 2004; Annex VI gives information on refugee populations and changes according to available statistics covering the period 1 January to 30 June 2004.

### II. UPDATE ON PROGRAMMES, BUDGETS AND FUNDING FOR 2004

2. The total Programme Budget for 2004 amounts to \$1,178.3 million. This comprises \$922.9 million under the Annual Programme Budget; \$222.6 million under eight Supplementary Programme Budgets; \$25.8 million under the United Nations Regular Budget, and \$7 million for Junior Professional Officers (JPOs).

### A. Annual Programme Budget

- 3. At its fifty-fourth session in October 2003, the Executive Committee<sup>1</sup> approved total budgetary requirements under the 2004 Annual Budget of \$954.9 million, which included an amount of \$922.9 million for the Annual Programme Budget, \$25 million from the United Nations Regular Budget and \$7 million for JPOs. The Annual Programme Budget also included an Operational Reserve of \$110.9 million consisting of \$60.9 million (7.5 per cent of programmed activities) for Category I activities and, on a trial basis, \$50 million for Category II activities. On 15 August 2004, the remaining appropriation level under Category I stood at \$29.2 million and under Category II at \$29.4 million.
- 4. Transfers from the 2004 Operational Reserve are shown in Annexes II and III. Transfers from Category I total \$31.7 million and include some \$17.2 million for Africa, mainly to ensure protection and humanitarian assistance to Chadian refugees, internally displaced persons and returnees as part of a United Nations collaborative effort Darfur, Western Sudan; to provide protection and humanitarian assistance for a new influx of Congolese refugees into Burundi; and to support repatriation and reintegration activities in Burundi and in Rwanda.

- 5. Since the 30<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Standing Committee, a further \$2.1 million has been transferred from Category II bringing the total amount transferred to \$20.6 million as at 15 August 2004. The latest contributions support the "4Rs" framework; the Comprehensive Plan of Action for Somali Refugees including a survey of movements of Somali refugees and asylum seekers; an irrigation project in Luwani camp in Malawi; and expanded activities for the prevention of sexual exploitation and gender-based violence. A report on the experience so far with the Operational Reserve Category II (EC/54/SC/CRP/18) has been issued separately.
- 6. In line with long-standing external audit recommendations, with effect from January 2004, UNHCR moved to accrual accounting in terms of expenditure recognition, in conjunction with the progressive implementation of the new "PeopleSoft" information management system. Until now, UNHCR has not reported actual levels of expenditure, which are the most accurate indications of the rate of implementation of operations; instead UNHCR has reported only obligation plans or budgetary allocations were reported. For the first time, actual expenditure constituting UNHCR's disbursements and commitments amounting to \$528.3 million is reported under column 4 in Annex 1. The rate and efficacy of implementing partner disbursements from instalments paid by UNHCR will continue to be closely monitored. This is a significant improvement in UNHCR's financial management capacity. Having said this, it should be stressed that at the time of report preparation, the accounts for the month of July were not completely closed; therefore the final level of expenditures may be somewhat higher than those reported in column 4.
- 7. Concerning the impact of currency exchange rate fluctuations on the 2004 Annual Programme Budget, the United States dollar remains relatively weak against other major currencies. For UNHCR globally this situation is expected to increase costs in US dollars by some \$20 million. However, this increase in costs is expected to be largely offset by an increase in income due to the impact of exchange fluctuations on many currencies.
- 8. As of mid-August, contributions received amounted to \$812.0 million, comprising \$723.9 million for the Annual Programme, \$15.4 million from the United Nations Regular Budget, \$2.5 million for JPOs. Annex V provides a further breakdown of contributions received from Non-Governmental Organizations, Foundations and private donors as at 15 August 2004 amounting to \$12.1 million. Total projected income for 2004 against the Annual Budget amounts to \$832.5 million, comprising \$799.6 million towards the Annual Programme Budget, \$25.8 million from the United Nations Regular Budget, and \$7.1 million for JPOs.
- 9. The expected funding shortfall for the Annual Programme at the end of 2004, after taking into account the carry-over from 2003 and secondary income, in addition to total projected contributions for 2004, but excluding contributions earmarked for the Junior Professional Officer Scheme, amounts to \$47.1 million (Annex 1, column 10). UNHCR is guardedly optimistic that this projected budgetary deficit will not require any reduction in field operations. However, action has been taken to reinforce fiscal discipline at Headquarters and in the Field following an assessment that expenditure trends through July are higher than those of previous years.

### B. Supplementary Programme Budgets

10. Total requirements for Supplementary Programme Budgets in 2004 stood at \$222.6 million as at 15 August 2004 (Annex 1, column 3). This figure includes new needs identified since the 30<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Standing Committee, amounting to \$41.9 million to cover the return and reintegration of Burundian refugees (\$21 million), and additional needs for the repatriation and reintegration of Sudanese refugees (\$20.9 million). Contributions received as of 15 August amounted to \$70.2 million after an amount of \$5.3 million - corresponding to 7 per cent of support costs applied to contributions received for supplementary programmes - was transferred to the Annual Programme. The expected shortfall for the Supplementary Programmes at the end of 2004 amounts to \$48 million.

### III. CONCLUSION

11. The financial situation of UNHCR remains stable but there is no room for complacency. The supplementary programmes established for Africa are in need of funding. However, UNHCR is concerned that such funding should not be to the detriment of planned resourcing of the Annual Programme. While the Office will exercise the utmost care in its use of resources, donors are urged to help minimize the risk of a conflict in programme funding emphasis by providing additional contributions to cover the expected overall funding shortfall amounting to \$95.1 million (including both Annual Programme and Supplementary Programme Budgets).
