

- More than 300 updates from States, organizations, businesses, and other entities
- 70.4% (212) in progress
- 22.2% (67) in the planning stage
- 22 from GRF fulfilled
- 15 from HLS on Statelessness fulfilled



## **SSAR Support Platform**

The Core Group currently includes Denmark, Germany, Japan, the Republic of Korea, Switzerland, Turkey, the United States of America, the European Union, World Bank and UNDP.

 The inaugural meeting of the Core Group of the Support Platform with the members of the SSAR Quadripartite Steering Committee will take place on 7 October 2020.



## MIRPS Support Platform

 10 states confirmed their membership to date (Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, the EU, France, Spain, Switzerland, Uruguay and the US. Italy and Holy See are observers)

#### Progress on Platform's workplan include:

- Opportunities for bilateral cooperation to strengthen asylum systems in MIRPS countries
- Matching opportunities of GRF pledges and needs in MIRPS countries
- Consultation with the business community led by OAS



## **IGAD Support Platform**

- In July, Sudan as current Chair of IGAD held a meeting with IGAD Ambassadors and the EU in Geneva to discuss next steps in the operationalization of the Support Platform
- Technical core group of the Nairobi process tasked to organise first virtual IGAD Support Platform meeting in Q4 2020
- Thematic Ministerial health meeting planned for end 2020



#### **Asylum Capacity Support Group (ACSG)**

#### **Matching Process**

- Prioritizing GRF pledges for initial matches
  - In line with prioritization criteria in ACSG Guide to Working Modalities
- Concretizing of prioritized GRF pledges in decentralized manner
  - Emphasis on evidence base for support request (capacity/gaps analysis)
- ACSG Secretariat coordinating cross-regional matches, while project development and implementation is done in-country
- In future: development of ACSG Online Portal



### Statelessness

- 396 pledges (out of which 270 State pledges)
- 15 pledges implemented (14 State pledges; 1 civil society pledge)
- Some examples of implemented pledges:
  - Malta acceded to the 1954 Convention and North
     Macedonia acceded to the 1961 Convention
  - Tajikistan signed an amnesty law benefiting stateless persons
  - Kazakhstan adopted a law to ensure that all children born in the country are registered at birth regardless of the legal status of their parents
  - The Central African Republic, Côte d'Ivoire and Rwanda adopted National Action Plans to End Statelessness






#### Pledge or Contribution Name

- A platform among operational actors that are promoting the integration of refugees through sport including thematic congress and online learning
- Accede to the 1954 and 1961 Conventions (2)
- Additional Casework Capacity for Resettlement and Complementary Pathways
- Addressing the educational needs of displaced boys and girls, adolescents and youth, through psychosocial care and prevention of the risk of dropping out of school, including teachers in high-risk situations
- Asylum-seekers included among the categories of persons to whom the Law on Compulsory Health Insurance applies
- Belize shall display protection information advising on the right to seek asylum in Belize at border entry points
- Challenges faced by Syrian Refugees in the higher education systems of host countries and how to overcome them. Lessons learned from Jordan


