### Update on budgets and funding (2020-2021)

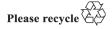
### Summary

As reported at the eightieth meeting of the Standing Committee in March 2021 (EC/72/SC/CRP.7), the final annual budget for 2020 was \$9,131.3 million, an increase of \$495.4 million, or 5.7 per cent, when compared to the final annual budget for 2019 of \$8,635.9 million.

Final expenditure for 2020 stood at \$4,837.7 million, an increase of \$422.4 million, or 9.6 per cent, compared to expenditure of \$4,415.3 million in 2019. With a total of \$5,403.6 million in funds available in 2020, \$565.9 million was carried over into 2021.

At its seventy-first plenary session in October 2020, the Executive Committee approved the revised annual budget of \$8,615.8 million for 2021. As at 30 April 2021, the cut-off date for the data used in this report, the current annual budget for 2021 stands at \$9,152.3 million, including two supplementary budgets amounting to \$536.5 million.

A draft decision on budgets and funding for 2020 and 2021 is provided in annex VIII.

### I. Introduction

1. The present document provides financial information on the final budget, funding and expenditure in 2020, and an update on UNHCR's requirements and funding for 2021 as at 30 April 2021. It should be noted that all income and expenditure amounts are expressed on a modified cash basis.<sup>1</sup>

The original and final budgets and expenditure for 2020 are summarized in annex I.

Annex II shows the revised and current annual budget and interim expenditure for 2021 as at the cut-off date of 30 April 2021.

Annex III provides the lists of transfers to and from the operational reserve in 2021 as at 30 April 2021.

Annex IV shows the breakdown of supplementary budgets in 2021 as at 30 April 2021.

Annex V shows overall contributions recorded for the budget year 2021 as at 30 April 2021.

Annex VI gives a breakdown by country of contributions from non-governmental organizations (NGOs), foundations and private donors in 2021.

Annex VII provides the list of unearmarked and softly earmarked voluntary contributions to UNHCR in 2021.

Annex VIII provides the draft decision on budgets and funding for 2020 and 2021.

2. UNHCR's 2020 Global Report provides further detailed information on the final budget and expenditure, as well as programme implementation and results for 2020.

### II. Requirements, funding available and expenditure in 2020

#### Total budget

3. In October 2019, at its seventieth session, the Executive Committee approved an original annual budget of \$8,667.7 million for 2020.<sup>2</sup> In October 2020, at its seventy-first session, the Executive Committee approved the revised annual budget of \$9,131.3 million for 2020.<sup>3</sup> The final 2020 budget of \$9,131.3 million represents the sum of the approved original budget of \$8,667.7 million and two supplementary budgets of a total of \$463.7 million established by the High Commissioner in the course of 2020 in accordance with article 7.5 of the UNHCR financial rules. Details are provided in table II.1 below.

4. A detailed breakdown of the original and final annual budgets for 2020, and final expenditure, is available in annex I.

#### Funding available

5. Total funds available for the budget year 2020 amounted to \$5,403.6 million, comprising \$410.9 million carried over from the budget year 2019; \$4,722.7 million in voluntary contributions for implementation in 2020; \$40.1 million from the United Nations regular budget; and \$229.8 million in other funds available and adjustments. This represents an overall increase in total funds available of \$577.3 million, or 12 per cent, when compared to 2019. Details are provided in table II.2 below.

6. The global needs of persons of concern to UNHCR continued to exceed the available funding, despite its increase. This resulted in a funding gap of \$3,727.8 million, or 41 per cent of needs remaining unfunded, compared to 44 per cent in 2019.

#### Expenditure

7. Total expenditure in 2020 amounted to \$4,837.7 million. This represents an increase of \$422.4 million, or 9.6 per cent, when compared to an expenditure of \$4,415.3 million in 2019.

8. Table II.3 provides the distribution of expenditure in 2020 and 2019 by region, global programmes and headquarters. It shows that nearly all of the increase in expenditure of \$422.4 million in 2020 (\$421.6 million) was in field operations. The table also shows a reduction in expenditure at Headquarters of \$23.1 million reflecting the relocation of regional bureaux to the field.

9. In West and Central Africa, expenditure in 2020 stood at \$442.5 million, a net increase of \$112.9 million, or 34 per cent, when compared to 2019. Major increases were recorded in programmes in Burkina Faso, Mali, the Niger and Nigeria. In 2020, the crisis in the Sahel region was exacerbated by the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic. Intensified violence caused a rise in the number of internally displaced persons (IDPs) by 80 per cent compared to 2019. Meanwhile, droughts, floods and other climate-related hazards left thousands without shelter. In response to the emergency in the Sahel region, UNHCR and its partners delivered life-saving assistance to ensure that the most basic needs were met. Some 154,000 people were provided with shelter-related support and nearly 80,000 households received core relief items.

10. In the East and Horn of Africa and the Great Lakes region, expenditure in 2020 amounted to \$863.3 million, a net increase of \$67.7 million, or 8.5 per cent, when compared with 2019. The increase includes programmes in the Sudan in relation to the emergency in Ethiopia. Over 6 million persons of concern accessed essential health care services and benefitted from information campaigns concerning COVID-19. UNHCR disbursed nearly \$30 million in cash assistance throughout the region, with 1 million refugees, IDPs and other persons of concern receiving COVID-19-specific cash assistance. With regard to the response to gender-based violence, some 12,000 survivors who reported incidents received psychosocial counselling. Across the region, 323,770 children and youth were supported with distance or home-based learning by the end of the year. Despite this, funding shortfalls compared to the needs meant that only 27 per cent of young refugees and children in the region were able to access distance learning programmes during COVID-19-related school closures.

11. In Southern Africa, expenditure in 2020 was \$199.5 million, a slight increase of \$3.3 million, or nearly 2 per cent, when compared to 2019. UNHCR provided protection and multi-sectoral assistance to persons of concern and host communities affected by a new emergency in Mozambique, and by protracted displacement. Some 1.4 million refugees, IDPs and other persons of concern received protection services. Cash assistance was increased in Angola, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Malawi, and Mozambique, and was introduced in South Africa for urban refugees impacted by COVID-19.

12. In the Middle East and North Africa region, expenditure amounted to \$1,352.9 million. This represented 28 per cent of UNHCR's total expenditure in 2020 and an increase of \$100.2 million, or 8 percent, compared to 2019. Expenditure mainly increased in Jordan, Lebanon, Libya and Yemen. The COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated the already precarious humanitarian situations in the region. UNHCR stepped up efforts to increase national health capacity with the aim of supporting refugees and other persons of concern

through national systems. Across the region, 5.2 million persons of concern benefited from community outreach services, while 2.6 million women and girls accessed information on protection risks and services. The region accounted for a quarter of UNHCR's global procurement, with \$300 million spent locally. The large-scale provision of emergency core relief items continued in Libya, the Syrian Arab Republic and Yemen, where more than 50 million core relief items were distributed. UNHCR provided support to over 30,000 survivors of gender-based violence with psychosocial counselling, as well as legal and medical assistance.

13. Expenditure in Asia and the Pacific in 2020 stood at \$442.9 million, representing 9.2 per cent of total expenditure and an increase of \$56.5 million, or 14.6 per cent, when compared with 2019. The main increases were seen in Myanmar and Pakistan. UNHCR implemented activities to mitigate risks related to child protection and gender-based violence, including sexual exploitation and abuse. In Bangladesh, Malaysia and Thailand, the Office supported community-based organizations and reinforced community networks amid restrictions resulting from COVID-19. With conflict-related internal displacement in Afghanistan, Myanmar and the Philippines, UNHCR advanced data-driven protection and solutions for IDPs. The Office also worked to reduce and prevent statelessness by supporting legal and policy reforms, particularly in Central Asia, where nationality issues were resolved for an estimated 34,600 people.

14. In 2020, expenditure in Europe stood at \$509.1 million. This represented 10.5 per cent of total expenditure, a net increase of \$11.8 million, or 2.4 per cent, compared to the previous year. The main increase was in Greece, where UNHCR worked with the Government to swiftly identify and move people at high risk of COVID-19 complications to safer accommodations. UNHCR advocated the inclusion of persons of concern across the region in national health responses, vaccination campaigns and social protection schemes. Cash assistance was expanded, targeting 520,383 vulnerable refugees and asylum-seekers.

15. Expenditure increased in the Americas by \$69.2 million, or 27.5 per cent, when compared to 2019. The most significant growth was in Colombia, Ecuador, Guatemala and Honduras. UNHCR provided support through protection monitoring, advocacy, outreach and assistance to an additional 64,000 displaced people in Colombia, and supported access to asylum in Ecuador. Due to continued forced displacement in the north of Central America, UNHCR supported government reception facilities in Honduras and provided assistance and protection at border locations in Guatemala. As a result, 574,000 people received assistance after being registered by UNHCR and partners, representing a 238 per cent rise in comparison to 2019. Cash assistance also increased, with 374,000 people being supported. UNHCR stepped up its shelter response in border areas and in urban centres across 15 countries to improve 652 facilities.

16. With regard to global programmes, expenditure increased by \$23.7 million, or 5 per cent, compared to 2019. One of the main increases was in the Division of Information Systems and Telecommunications due to investments in cyber security, the replacement of obsolete equipment, and in the business transformation programme. The other main increase was incurred under executive direction and management due to the strengthening of the enterprise risk management 2.0 initiative in field operations and the creation of a small liaison office to engage with the recently established regional bureaux.

17. Headquarters saw a decrease in expenditure of \$23.1 million, or nearly 10 per cent, in comparison to 2019. This represented the net effect of the newly relocated regional bureaux to the field, as well as investments in donor relations and mobilization, enhancements of policy and law services in field protection, and the organization's results-based management renewal project.

18. Table II.4 compares the distribution of expenditure by pillar. The relative share of expenditure by pillars has remained stable between 2020 and 2019, except for pillar 3 which saw an increase of over 50 per cent due to the significant rise in the number of refugee and IDP returnees in the Syrian Arab Republic. Table II.5 compares funds available, expenditure and carry-over in 2020 and 2019.

### III. Update on budget and funding for 2021

#### *Revised and current budget*

19. The original annual budget for 2021, approved by the Executive Committee at its seventieth plenary session in October 2019, stood at 8,615.8 million.<sup>4</sup> In October 2020, the Executive Committee at its seventy-first session approved a revised annual budget for 2021 for the same amount of 8,615.8 million.<sup>5</sup>

### Supplementary budgets

20. In March 2021, at the eightieth meeting of the Standing Committee, a 2021 budget of \$9,152.3 million was reported as at January 2021, including \$536.5 million in supplementary budgets. The supplementary budgets comprised: i) \$454.8 million to support needs related to the exceptional socioeconomic and protection impacts of COVID-19; and to support critical needs with regard to health, water, sanitation and hygiene, and shelter that could not be mainstreamed into the 2021 Global Appeal; and ii) \$81.7 million for the emergency situation in Ethiopia. This amount remains unchanged as of 30 April 2021. A breakdown of 2021 supplementary budgets by situation, region and pillar is shown in annex IV.

#### Transfers and other adjustments

21. In addition to the supplementary budgets established for 2021, the current annual budget for 2021 incorporates transfers to and from the operations reserve, as well as other internal adjustments made by the High Commissioner in accordance with financial rule

7.4. One transfer relates to the budget reduction of \$63.4 million for the global fleet management. The operations reserve was increased by the same amount so that the total appropriation approved by the Executive Committee would remain unchanged. Details of the transfers from the operational reserve are presented in annex III.

22. Table III.1 below shows the current distribution of budgets by region, global programmes and headquarters as at 30 April 2021, compared to the previous report of 31 January. The largest increase of \$13.1 million for the southern Africa region is attributed to transfers from the operations reserve in response to the Central African Republic situation. The main decrease is under global programmes, representing the effect of a budget reduction with regard to the global fleet management. Table III.2 provides the current budget by pillar as at 30 April 2021. Under pillar 3, the increase of \$11.3 million is the result of the reallocation of resources from pillar 1 in support of the voluntary repatriation and reintegration of Burundian returnees in 2021. COVID-19-related emergency intra-regional reallocations caused the decrease under pillar 4.

24. As at 30 April 2021, voluntary contributions of \$1,902.0 million had been received or pledged for the budget year 2021, including \$195 million from NGOs, foundations and private donors. At the same time last year, \$1,729.6 million had been received or pledged, including \$157.5 million from NGOs, foundations, and private donors.

25. In view of the current demands placed on the Office, donors are encouraged to continue to respond generously to the High Commissioner's appeal for resources to meet the current annual budget, including through unearmarked funds.

### Annex VIII

#### Draft decision on budgets and funding for 2020 and 2021

#### The Standing Committee,

*Recalling* the Executive Committee's decisions, at its seventieth and seventy-first sessions on administrative, financial and programme matters (A/AC.96/1198, para. 13 and A/AC.96/1209, para. 12), as well as its discussions under the programme budgets and funding item at the eightieth meeting of the Standing Committee in March 2021,

*Reaffirming* the importance of greater responsibility-sharing in solidarity with countries hosting refugees,

*Recalls* that the Executive Committee, at its seventieth session, approved original programmes and budgets for regional programmes, global programmes and headquarters under UNHCR's 2020-2021 biennial programme budget, amounting to \$8,667.7 million and \$8,615.8 million for 2020 and 2021, respectively,

*Recalls* that the Executive Committee, at its seventy-first session, approved revised programmes and budgets for regional programmes, global programmes and headquarters under UNHCR's 2020-2021 biennial programme budget (revised), amounting to \$9,131.3 million and \$8,615.8 million for 2020 and 2021 respectively,

*Takes note* of the increase in UNHCR's annual budget for 2020 to a final total of \$9,131.3 million, representing the sum of the original budget of \$8,667.7 million and the final supplementary budgets of \$463.7 million,

Takes note of the financial and budgetary performance in 2020,

*Notes* that the supplementary budgets for 2021, which amount to \$536.5 million as at 30 April 2021 are for programmes benefiting UNHCR's global refugee programme and for internally displaced persons,

*Takes note* of the increase in UNHCR's annual budget for 2021 to a current total of \$9,152.3 million as at 30 April 2021, representing the sum of the revised budget of \$8,615.8 million and the supplementary budgets of \$536.5 million,

*Recognizes* that emergencies and unforeseen activities unfolding in 2021 may result in the need for additional or expanded supplementary budgets and that additional resources, over and above those for existing budgets, would be needed to meet such needs, and

*Urges* member States to continue to respond generously, in the spirit of solidarity and in a timely manner, to the High Commissioner's appeal for resources to meet in full the annual budget for 2021.
