

Cyprus

September 2021

UNHCR has been present in Cyprus since 1974. In 2000, Cyprus adopted its first refugee legislation and asylum procedures, and took over asylum adjudication in 2002.

Context: Among EU member states, Cyprus is a frontline state that has the highest per capita numbers of arrivals, among whom are people forced to flee and in need of international protection.

UNHCR counters negative public perceptions with interviews, statements, positive social media content, and supporting the promotion of human rights and social inclusion.

COVID-19 PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

Advocacy: UNHCR successfully advocated for the inclusion of persons of concern in the National Vaccination Plan.

Inclusion: Since asylum-seekers have no access to the general health care system, collaboration with partners, NGOs and the Ministry of Health resulted in solutions such as mobile units to offer vaccination to reception centre residents.

Communication with Communities: UNHCR and partners shared vaccination information on the Help Platform and social media, and through Refugee Outreach Volunteers, and developed print material addressing misconceptions regarding vaccines.

Health: UNHCR continues to monitor and advocate for improved hygiene conditions and prevention of the spread of COVID-19 among reception facility residents.

HIGHLIGHTS

UNHCR donated relief assistance

and offered technical expertise and counselling to improve conditions at the reception centers, which currently operate within capacity, including for vulnerable individuals and UASC. UNHCR is ready to further support the authorities with the challenges faced.

Integration

Over the years, UNHCR has offered recommendations to enhance integration prospects of refugees. Some are included the new National Integration Plan for Third-Country Nationals for the programming period 2021 – 2027 published in June 2021

Portraits & Human Stories

UNHCR has collaborated with photographer Sebastian Rich to capture portraits of refugees and asylum-seekers to accompany human stories highlighting the challenges they face, as well as their strength and contributions to society. A printed publication is forthcoming.

UNHCR'S PROTECTION CHIEF VISITS CYPRUS, ADDRESSES CHALLENGES IN ACCESS TO ASYLUM





Key Priorities

- Monitoring and promoting respect for refugee rights and the standards of treatment of asylumseekers, particularly as regards access to asylum procedures, reception conditions and detention.
- Influencing legislation affecting refugees and asylum-seekers by providing expert advice and comments on relevant draft laws to ensure compliance with international and EU standards.
- Providing technical assistance, legal advice and other support to assist the authorities in further strengthening their refugee status determination procedures and ensure quality decision-making.
- Monitoring and advocacy on timely and accurate identification of UASC to ensure that UASC have effective access to the national child protection system with respect to accurate and timely identification; registration and documentation; guardianship and legal representation; adequate care and supervision; tracing and family reunification by way of best interest determination.
- Training of key stakeholders from the government and civil society on basic protection issues, including refugee rights, reception conditions for asylumseekers, durable solutions and child protection.
- Integration: Promoting good practices in relation to policies and measures that support effective integration of refugees into the social, economic and cultural fabric, including advocacy for naturalization, long-term residence permits and family reunification.
- Promoting accession to the Statelessness Conventions.
- Strengthening public information through education, awareness-raising, with media, campaigns, events and constituency-building.
- Strengthening partnerships with NGOs and other civil society actors involved in refugee protection.

Working with Partners

- The Government is UNHCR's key partner to ensure protection of refugees and asylum-seekers in accordance with EU and international standards. UNHCR co-operates with Parliamentary committees, Ombudsman, Office of the Child Commissioner, diplomatic missions and the media.
- UNHCR has forged links across civil society.
 Currently, UNHCR has a funding-based partnership agreement with two NGOs.

Statelessness

Cyprus has not acceded to the 1954 and 1961 Statelessness Conventions. Provisions in the Refugee Law allowing for humanitarian status for stateless persons in need of protection outside the scope of the refugee definition have since 2014 been abolished, leaving stateless persons without any protection. Most still resort to asylum procedures.
