
**Strategic Partner:** Iceland continues to be a strong partner of UNHCR. Relative to its size, Iceland makes significant contributions to the protection of refugees and stateless persons. **Protection and Solidarity:** Iceland remains committed to its international obligations and fulfilled its pledge to accept 120 persons evacuated from Afghanistan.

Statelessness: Iceland, through its accession to both Statelessness Conventions, is actively working toward the eradication of statelessness.

### **COVID-19 PREVENTION AND RESPONSE**

Advocacy: UNHCR regularly monitors developments and is in contact with authorities and partners where needed to ensure that persons of concern are included and mainstreamed in pandemic prevention and response programmes.

Inclusion: Refugees in Iceland are included in the national COVID-19 response and provided with social support and other measures to mitigate unemployment and income loss. Low vaccination rates among persons of concern to UNHCR remain a challenge.

### HIGHLIGHTS

### **New Arrivals**

During last five months of 2021, 585 persons sought asylum in Iceland, marking a significant increase from the first seven months of the year when 285 persons sought asylum.

### Resettlement

Iceland remains strongly committed to protect the most vulnerable, which is clearly demonstrated through its consistent offering of 100 resettlement places annually, and the welcoming of an additional 120 persons evacuated from Afghanistan in 2021.

### Statelessness

Since acceding to both Statelessness Conventions in 2021, Iceland has continued to work toward operationalizing its statelessness determination procedure with the aim to eradicate Statelessness.

# **Key Priorities**

- Asylum procedures: UNHCR promotes fair and efficient asylum procedures and provides guidance to relevant government agencies and NGOs, including on follow-up meetings on the 2016 Quality Initiative to strengthen the asylum procedures. UNHCR also supports the Icelandic Red Cross with their legal aid, when requested.
- Resettlement and complementary pathways: Iceland remains an important actor in supporting resettlement globally. Iceland has remained steadfast in its support, including by contributing to evacuations from Afghanistan of vulnerable refugees in 2021.
- Integration: UNHCR and partners continue to monitor the alignment of entitlements and rights for individuals with different legal status (continuous arrivals and resettled refugees). UNHCR also works with the Council of Europe's Intercultural City Programme as well as the Multicultural Information Centre to support local-level integration efforts.
- Capacity-building: UNHCR works with various stakeholders, both governmental and nongovernmental, to build capacities linked to the asylum procedure as well as the statelessness determination procedure.

## Working with Partners

- In addition to working with relevant government agencies—efforts strengthened in the latter part of 2021—on legal matters, UNHCR also works with the Icelandic Red Cross on individual cases. Moreover, UNHCR has a good working relationship with all relevant stakeholders, including the UN Association in Iceland which is an important partner in sharing information related to the plight of refugees and stateless persons.
- External engagement: UNHCR continues to work with partners to raise awareness on asylum, family reunification, integration and statelessness issues. UNHCR also promotes and works to secure the inclusion of refugee voices in the public debate.

## Statelessness

 Iceland acceded to both the 1954 and 1961
Statelessness Conventions on 26 January 2021.
Since then, the focus has shifted towards operationalizing the statelessness determination procedures.
