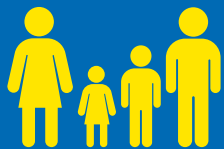
## REFUGEE ZAKAT FUND ENDORSEMENTS

A few days ahead of the blessed month, UNHCR launched its 5<sup>th</sup> Islamic Philanthropy Annual Report, highlighting the significant impact of Zakat and Sadaqah contributions on the most vulnerable beneficiaries among refugees and displaced populations worldwide.

The Refugee Zakat Fund continues to be the primary driver of much-needed humanitarian assistance during Ramadan and beyond. Trusted and compliant, the most recent fatwas endorsing the UNHCR Refugee Zakat Fund were received in 2022 from the Islamic Affairs and Charitable Activities Department of Dubai, the Fiqh Majlis of Canada, the Tri-State Imams Council (USA), and the Supreme Council of Imams and Islamic Affairs of Brazil, bringing up the total number of endorsements to 15.

Each kit included **plastic sheets, blankets, solar lanterns, sleeping mats and other urgent items**. In the form of Sanad, your donation gave them a lifeline through core relief items vital to their survival.

More people are crossing borders daily



On April 15th, just a few days before Eid, an armed conflict began in Sudan. Within the first few days, an estimated 10,000 to 20,000 people fled the Darfur region, seeking refuge in neighboring Chad. A majority of them were women and children. UNHCR immediately began to work closely with the Government of Chad and its partners to assess their needs and prepare a joint response.

So far, the number of forcibly displaced individuals from the recent conflict has exceeded one million people. Amongst those, nearly 250,000 have been forced to flee their country, with more crossing borders daily, seeking safety in **Chad,**

**Ethiopia, Central African Republic, and Egypt.** Additionally, hundreds of thousands have been internally displaced with many more confined to their homes, unable to access urgent necessities.

UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency, has deployed teams and, with partners, has rushed to deliver aid from the onset of the emergency. The initial, most pressing, needs are water, food, shelter, health care, child protection, and prevention of gender-based violence. Due to the violence experienced by those crossing the border, psychosocial support is also among our top priorities.
