

Informed decision-making in urban crises: Can area-based data make a difference?

By 2050, over 70% of the global population will live in urban areas. As people head to cities, vulnerabilities and pressure on services and infrastructure are likely to intensify, particularly in contexts characterized by urban displacement. Refugees and IDPs have increasingly sought shelter within host communities and unofficial sites, creating a new set challenges for humanitarian response, including data collection for targeting, assistance delivery and evidence-based decision-making. Against the background of complex urban crises, the area-based approach to assessments (ABA) has been gaining prominence as a tool to fill pressing information gaps.

Join us for an interactive workshop on ABA, where you will be placed in the centre of an urban refugee response planning exercise and given the chance to exchange with colleagues on experiences and lessons learned from working with area-based data.
