<u>Title of session:</u> Evidence for Action: Connecting people and data in support of evidence-informed outcomes

Date: Thursday, 4 July 2019

Executive Summary:

Timely, reliable and useable data is key to identify protection risks, needs, vulnerabilities and capacities of affected people in displacement situations. With the point of departure in the overall theme "Working together, better", this session will focus on advancing the discussion on and making recommendations for how data and evidence support the planning, prevention and delivery of responses to protection needs, finding and implementing solutions to displacement, and ensuring progress towards collective outcomes.

In recent years, several frameworks and approaches have been developed as part of collective efforts to strengthen the evidence base for improved planning and response to forced displacement. One of these is the Protection Information Management (PIM) Conceptual Framework, which aims to ensure safe, responsible and meaningful data management for evidence-informed protection outcomes. This session will take a field practitioner's perspective to explore the practical elements of generating and using data as an evidence base for the delivery of collective outcomes. Practitioners will share and discuss initiatives, frameworks and approaches aimed at ensuring principled and purposeful data collection, analysis and use for evidence-informed action, and lessons learned about the challenges and impact of applying these at the field level.

Part I Meaningful Engagement with Affected Communities: From informants to partners will focus on the participation of and engagement with affected people and communities in data collection, analysis and use.

Part II A Collective Commitment to Evidence: Coordination for taking the lead will focus on using evidence for collective outcomes, i.e. on how data is shared with and used by coordination structures for joint analysis, planning and response for evidence-informed collective outcomes.

Concept Note:

Background and link to the theme

Timely, reliable and useable data is key to identify protection risks, needs, vulnerabilities and capacities of affected people in displacement situations. <u>Part I</u> *Meaningful Engagement with Affected Communities: From informants to partners* will focus on sharing and discussing examples of frameworks and approaches aimed at ensuring the *participation of and engagement with affected people and communities* in primary data collection, analysis and use, in the spirit of commitments under Accountability to Affected Populations and the principles and practices of responsible and ethical data approaches, as well as engaging with affected people through feedback mechanisms, which provide data on programme response and unmet needs.

<u>Part II</u> A Collective Commitment to Evidence: Coordination for a taking the lead will focus on sharing and discussing examples of frameworks and approaches aimed at ensuring the use of data and evidence for collective outcomes, i.e. how data is shared with and used by coordination structures for joint analysis, planning and response for evidence-informed collective outcomes.

Objectives of the Session

- Share frameworks and approaches to data collection, analysis and use for evidenceinformed planning, response and other collective outcomes
- Discuss lessons learned, good practices, challenges, and the impact of applying frameworks and approaches in a) the engagement with affected people in data collection, analysis and use, and b) the use of data by coordination structures for joint analysis, planning and response
- Provide recommendations for ensuring the principled, collaborative and effective generation and use of evidence for collective responses to displacement situations

Desired outcomes of the session:

- Frameworks and approaches facilitating safe, responsible and meaningful data collection, analysis and use for evidence-informed responses to protection risks and displacement needs shared
- Good field practices of applying frameworks and approaches for engaging with affected communities in the collection, analysis and use of data for evidence-informed planning and response identified
- Recommendations on gaps to be addressed to ensure the principled, collaborative and effective generation and use of evidence for collective outcomes to displacement situations provided.

• **Translators without Borders**, *Mia Marzotto, Head of Advocacy*Focus on common services for community engagement and accountability and the importance of language and translation when engaging with communities to generate quality data.
