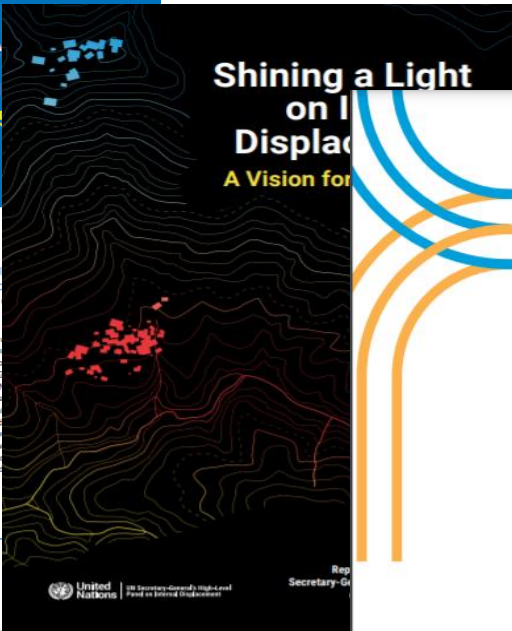
UNHCR engagement in the Grand Bargain
Progress made over the past five years

In the five years since the *Grand Bargain* was launched, UNHCR has seen improved effectiveness and efficiency of humanitarian response, UN increased funding and support for national and local reporting requirements, and successfully partnered with including International Financial Institutions.

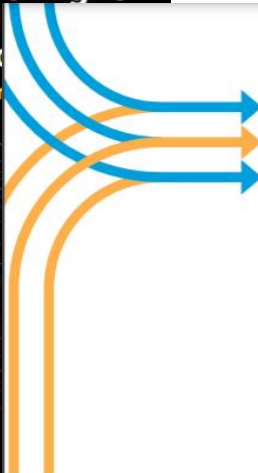
Greater aid effectiveness has been achieved through coordinated initiatives including the UN Partner Portal, the Business Operations Strategy, and participation in joint needs assessments. The change in policy and systems has improved effectiveness and efficiency, and ultimately helps to better serve UNHCR's persons of concern. Despite the progress, this has so far not resulted in a greater proportion of unearmarked contributions. In fact unearmarked funding has not increased since 2016, holding steady at an average of 15% annually.

In addition to the progress made, UNHCR's collective progress through the Grand Bargain, in partnership with other UN agencies, IASC, and the International Financial Institutions. Since October 2021, UNHCR has facilitated more national and local reporting requirements, and successfully partnered with including International Financial Institutions. The forthcoming period will see a revised framework for the *Grand Bargain 2.0* – a resolution to ensure the highest priorities of quality funding.

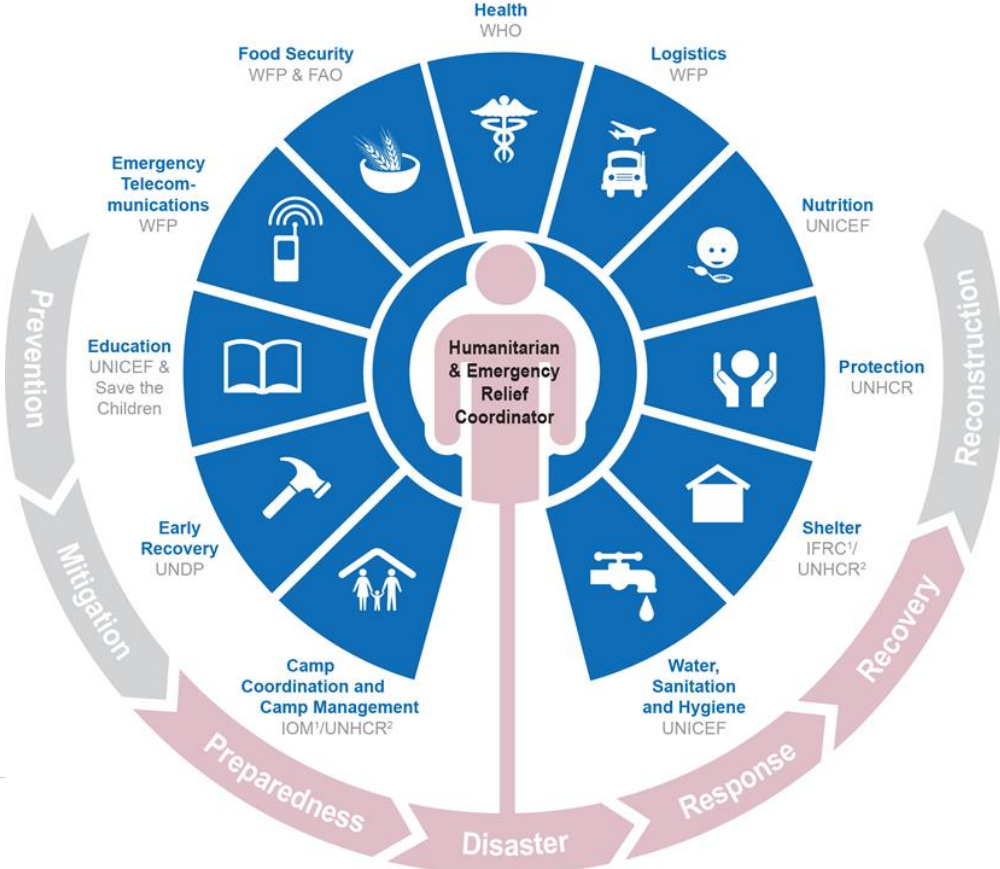
